"WE THE PEOPLE"

The Gabriel Heatter broadcast of April 25, 1939. The first national exposure for Alcoholics Anonymous came with the April 25, 1939 "We The People" broadcast. Gabriel Heatter's radio program was a tremendously popular program that was tuned in by millions of people. Morgan R., the AA member who spoke on the program, was expected to launch sales of the newly published book, *Alcoholics Anonymous*. How Morgan was prepared for his three-minute talk, and the resulting book sales are described in the A.A.W.S. publication *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age* on pages 174-175. This is a transcript of the interview:

HEATTER: The man beside me now has had one of the most gripping and dramatic experiences I've ever heard. I'm not going to tell you his name. And when you hear what he has to say I think you'll understand why. But after checking the facts, the Listeners Committee of "We The People" decided to grant him time because they feel that if one person is helped by hearing his story, then WE THE PEOPLE will have done a real service. Alright, sir.

ANONYMOUS GUEST: Six months ago I got out of an insane asylum. I'd been sent there because I was drinking myself to death. But the doctors said they could do nothing for me. And only four years ago I was making 20,000 dollars a year. I was married to a swell girl and had a young son. But I worked hard and like lots of my friends - I used to drink to relax. Only they knew when to stop. I didn't. And pretty soon - I drank myself out of my job. I promised my wife I'd straighten out. But I couldn't. Finally she took the baby and left me. The next year was like a nightmare. I was penniless. I went out on the streets - panhandled money for liquor. Every time I sobered up - I swore not to touch another drop. But if I went a few hours without a drink - I'd begin to cry like a baby, and tremble all over. One day after I left the asylum I met a friend of mine. He took me to the home of one of his friends. A bunch of men were sitting around, smoking cigars, telling jokes - having a great time. But I noticed they weren't drinking. When Tom told me they'd all been in the same boat as I was - I couldn't believe him. But he said, "See that fellow? He's a doctor. Drank himself out of his practice. Then he straightened out. Now he's head of a big hospital." Another big

Called themselves Alcoholics Anonymous. And they'd worked out a method of recovery. One of their most important secrets was - helping the other fellow. Once they began to follow it the method proved successful and helped others get on their feet - they found they could stay away from liquor.

A Brief Guide to the Activities & Structure of General Services in District 2

Your GSR: The General Service Representative links their group with AA as a whole. As the voice of your group, the GSR brings the group's conscience to the District Committee member (DCM) through the Delegate who passes it to the General Service Conference held each year in April. The GSR keeps the group well informed about news and events in District 2, South Florida Area 15, and the General Service Office in New York. They act as a guardian of the Traditions for the group. It is suggested that GSR's have at least 2 years of sobriety.

Your DCM: The District Committee Member (DCM) is the link between the group GSRs and the Area's Delegate to the General Service Conference. Each DCM represents eight to twelve groups, and communicates the collective conscience of those groups to the Delegate and votes on matters affecting the South Florida Area at business meetings. GSR's also have a vote. Generally, DCM's have four years of experience as past ACM or GSR.

District 2: District 2 is the General Service body for groups in Hillsborough and East Pasco Counties. It provides a forum for sharing the collective 12th step experience of the groups and committees, and is supported by the contributions of the groups it serves. The District Committee is composed of seventeen DCM's who represent groups, and who meet monthly along with the GSR's and chairpersons to share their collective experience.

District Meeting: District Meetings are held the first Sunday of each month at 4:40 pm for all group GSR'S. There is a GSR orientation at 3:30 pm for new GSR's. All Officers, Committee Chairs and District Committee Members report the activities of their committees and groups. The meeting is held at the Bayshore Baptist Church on Morrison Avenue and South MacDill.

District Officers: The <u>Chairperson</u> conducts the monthly District meeting. All GSR's, Committee Chairs, and DCM's attend. The <u>Alternate Chair</u> assists the Chairperson. The <u>Treasurer</u> deposits all District contributions into the District bank account and disburses funds according to District practices. The <u>Registrar</u> maintains current listings of groups and GSR's and reports changes to the Area Registrar. The <u>Secretary</u> keeps and distributes the minutes of the District business meeting. Eligibility for these positions is five years of sobriety and service experience as a past or present DCM, ACM or GSR.

Since Mark L. has served as our treasurer for the past two years, it was also time for the committee to elect a new treasurer and alternate treasurer. Jim L. was nominated by the committee and was unanimously voted in by the committee. Mark L. will serve as the alternate treasurer until Jim is comfortable with his new position and all of the duties that entails. If anyone is interested in serving as the alternate treasurer for the committee, please contact Mark L. at 813-477-6855. As for the rest of the committee, it has remained the same. Tom F. reported that he spoke with a man from the Gainesville Corrections Institution who is interested in having someone write him. He will be released to Hillsborough County in few months, and is interested in attending meetings. Any men that are interested, please contact Tom at the number below. Joe L., pre-release coordinator, was not able to attend today, but reported that the 2 of the 3 inmates from last month were released and met up with a couple of the volunteers and taken to their first AA meeting. That is one of the most rewarding experiences in Alcoholics Anonymous! Thanks for facilitating that Joe! All is well in women's jail. Buddy H. reported that men's Falkenburg meetings are going great. Paul D. informed us that all men's meetings at Orient are doing fine, but that the work release meeting has been cancelled. Jill J. reported that women's prison is doing well. One of the former inmates was asked to write a letter to the warden about her personal success with AA as a result of the meetings brought in, and the warden has now asked the counselors at the prison to recommend the meetings to all of their inmate patients. Cathleen C. said that women's Pasco meetings are going well, but they could still use some help on Thursday nights. Please call Cathleen if you are interested in getting clearance to help out. Rob T. is getting in touch with one of the doctor's that requested meetings for the VA Hospital, to start bringing meetings in to their facility, but other than that, all is well.

In Memory of Wesie P.

The Alcoholics Anonymous Fellowship, the Odessa/Tampa community, friends and family are deeply saddened to advise of the passing of one of Tampa's most faithful and devoted members of AA, Wesie Peter. With forty-six years of AA service, she opened her doors at all hours to alcoholics in need.

Wesie is survived by hundreds of recovering alcoholics who knew and loved her. They are the grateful recipients of her continuous efforts to help others, setting the example for all. AA, indeed, became her life. After years of battling alcohol, surviving asylums and institutions and undergoing the early medical treatments for this misunderstood disease; Wesie picked up her last white chip on June 15, 1962. As she recounted innumerable times in meetings. on this auspicious morning at sunrise, she lifted her clenched hand to God and said, "God, if you will help me to stop drinking, I'll do whatever it takes to stay sober." She never found it necessary to take a drink of alcohol again. As she went through the 12 steps of the program, the first person on her 8th step amends list was her mother. Wesie said that there was "no way" she could make amends for the years of pain she had subjected her mother to because of this disease. Her mother kept it simple and said, "All I want is for you to stay sober for the rest of your life." That's exactly what Wesie did.

Wesie often spoke of the early years in AA when women generally did their drinking hidden away at home. This resulted in fewer women joining AA early on. In those days, men also sponsored women and meetings were few and far away. Wesie's first sponsor was a man and she went on 12 step calls in neighborhoods that no one else would enter. She started AA meetings that thrive to this day. Wesie provided a safe haven for women in her own home, and was always available. She would often say, "Day or night, you can call me anytime, I'm probably awake anyway." For decades she hosted an informal Wednesday night women's meeting in her home. "This is not official AA", she'd say. "The Big Book" and "The 12 and 12" were read and discussed, as well as personal issues. She always served coffee and something sweet to eat. Wesie loved it when a newcomer would show up, which happened often.

In early sobriety, Wesie held a variety of positions and found her niche in government service, which she worked until retirement age. Subsequently, Wesie had even more time to dedicate to helping others recover and work the steps. We would be remiss if we didn't mention that Wesie was an avid BUCS fan and a season ticket holder. A BUCS game was the ONLY excuse to miss a meeting. Wesie loved reading AA literature and good mysteries. She was passionate about her family, her cats (especially Minnie and Sox), roses, and the neighborhood kids. However, if you were a newcomer, you had her undivided attention.

Hundreds of us (maybe thousands) have had the privilege of being directly inspired by Wesie's experience, strength and hope. There is no question that her single wish would be for Alcoholics Anonymous to continue forever. We all may continue Wesie's legacy by passing on the AA message, as she did. All the time, One Day at a Time.

Recently we wrote a book called "*Alcoholics Anonymous*". It tells precisely how we all came back from a living death. Working on that book made me realize how much other people had suffered - how they'd gone through the same thing I did. That's why I wanted to come on this program. 


