#### SUGGESTIONS ON SPONSORSHIP

#### LEARNING TO LIVE AND LIVING TO LEARN

Perhaps there is no more important aspect of the AA way of life than sponsorship. And yet, probably, there is no characteristic of our Fellowship that receives less systematic, informative attention These few thoughts, hopefully, will prove helpful both to new members and older times who feel themselves inadequately informed on the role of sponsor. However let us first distinguish Twelfth Step work from sponsorship. It will be seen that they are not identical, although the Twelfth Stepper may become the sponsor of one or more of his "callees". In Twelfth Step calls, all members are encouraged to become involved as soon as they find their feet and settle down to live with the daily miracle of sobriety. A new member's own inner experience of his sincerity and commitment to Alcoholics Anonymous will urge him irresistibly to become available, when asked, to make Twelfth Step calls, and follow up these contacts, to ensure the sick alcoholic's arrival at and welcome to meetings. Thereafter his contact with his "callee" may well taper off to occasional encounters at meetings. In Twelfth Step work we primarily are carrying the general message of AA that there is a way out of alcoholism. And we do that by sharing our experience "....what it was like, what happened, and what it is like now". To highlight the distinction, let us now turn our attention to the qualities demanded of good sponsorship in AA.

- (1) **GROUPS** ensure an immediate warm, caring welcome to every newcomer and visitor entering the doors for the first time.
- (2) **SECRETARIES** make sure that every newcomer is introduced personally to three or four strong members, who in turn should see that the newcomer has their telephone numbers and assurances of readiness and availability to answer newcomer's calls.
- (3) **THE SPONSOR** will be true friend, educator, guide and counselor—one who will generously care about the detailed growing pains of and maturing of the "sponsoree" in the AA way of life.
- (4) LENGTH OF SOBRIETY of the sponsor is a very relative measure. It really can only be assessed in relation to the possession by the sponsor of the other qualities listed below. It will be obvious in the light of damage done to ourselves in chronic alcoholism, that these attributes may take years to

(5) **QUALITY OF SOBRIETY** is the keynote. The maturity demanded of a Sponsor can be developed only through years of living the AA Twelve Steps. These characteristic echoes of the promises on pages 83, 84 of the Big Book will appear only as the result of these steps, an unreserved fidelity to the whole process.

After fourteen years of abusing and being used by alcohol I re-entered the doors of Alcoholics Anonymous in terror, frustration, bewilderment and despair. How to undertake the business of living was a complete mystery to me. So many days had I spent waiting for the big break, the perfect solution, that I was sick at the prospect of continuing misery and failure, yet terrified, despite my many suicide attempts, to bring the whole sorry mess to a conclusion. In truth I came, with very limited expectations, to be able to exist for a little time without the recurring misery which the drinking bouts left behind. I thought would be enough for me, I could not ask for sober living because living was a phenomenon with which I was not familiar. In my first time around A.A. I had been through the stage of resentment at the word God and it no longer troubled me, vet neither did it help me because I was by then an unwilling non-believer. Lack of faith in anybody or anything either natural or supernatural was indeed my dilemma. At the time this seemed to be the last staging post, yet curiously enough I found it helpful, there were no more questions or debates. I had come back to Alcoholics Anonymous without a shred of faith simply because there was nowhere else to go. And so I returned with a feeling of resignation that I might as well go through the motions for a little longer for whatever time there might be left. Towards the end I had become a bout drinker, each bout culminating in another period of hospitalization, and between each drinking session I had attended many meetings of A.A. and had indeed been quite active. I had become familiar with the words of A.A., yet the language might as well have been some African tribal dialect for all the sense it made to me. When I returned with my feeling of resignation they were still saving the same words and still they were only words. They talked of such things as rock bottom and acceptance and at the time they still meant nothing as applied to me. One phrase which I had over my three years of sporadic attendance grown to actively dislike was the suggestion "it gets better". I had been dried out and felt better and seen it get better many times only to plunge into vet another bout, so the phrase seemed particularly meaningless. One day about six weeks after my last drink I wakened and thought that I might like to speak on the phone with a member of A.A. whom I knew. This was new for, though in the past I had had many conversations with many members, not once had I done so because I wanted to. I made my call and the conversation was of no great significance, but the call was because for the first time in my life I was talking with another human being, one whom I recognized as being of my own kind. Before the day was through I made another discovery-I wanted to live. I did not want to drink, and, Oh God, I believed these things might be possible for me. I believed, I had faith, and these things were real, they were not some abstruse piece of metaphysical philosophy but were a

product of my acceptance, the sharing of others of my kind at meetings and since they had not grown out of any conscious desire or decision on my part they must have come about through the intervention of some Power outside of me. I had been welcomed home. I did not know it at the time but the first two steps of the A.A. programme had just taken me. From that day on I gradually began to emerge into a new world called reality, it was confusing and upsetting, and not only did I need meetings to have it explained ever so gently and indirectly to me, at times I wanted desperately to hide in these meetings and with the members of A.A. from this confusion and upset. At such times it was pointed out to me that the programme is designed for living sober and that reality demanded that I go to work and mix daily with those to whom my illness was merely a word. I am to this day humbly grateful to those who made this suggestion. I have found that the words reality and spirituality have become practically synonymous and that peace of mind is only possible for me to the degree to which I am able to know in any day the truth about myself. Meditation is helpful today in allowing me to improve my perspective on my life, but I find that it is a tool rather than an end in itself, which cam enable me to bring into focus the lessons I have learned in the school of living. It seems to me fitting that after forty years experience in the business of recovery by individuals from alcoholism this experience is summed up in the title of only the sixth book to be published by the fellowship in that time—Living Sober. I am truly blessed that I survived suffering long enough to be guided by the love in A.A. to an understanding and appreciation of the simple act of living. <b>Eric from Nottingham Reprinted from the Roundabout / Glasgow, Scotland / October 1978</b>	<ul> <li>prudence, patient, detachment, and moral courage, are essential. Sponsorship entails the acceptance of significant responsibility for the spiritual welfare of the sponsoree. Great detachment is necessary to keep the sponsor free of unconscious manipulation of the sponsee. We must remember that we are but mirrors reflecting back to the sponsoree. We do not impose our brand of AA on him, but encourage him to search fearlessly an honestly for his own way.</li> <li>(7) ATTRACTION rather than promotion entails that the sponsor be sought by the Sponsore, the newcomer should be very ware of would-be Sponsors seeking out novices. However a newcomer should be encouraged not to be shy about asking another member to be their Sponsor.</li> <li>(8) PRUDENCE indicates that the principle that men should sponsor men and women should sponsor women is worth very careful consideration. There are exceptions to this principle but they should be made only if both sides are suitably aware of the enormous importance of emotional maturity and objectivity in mixed relationships. AA experience shows that this matter is a danger to both the sponsor and sponsoree.</li> <li>(9) GENEROSITY with his time is a necessary attribute of a good sponsor—in some cases to an heroic degree. But the sponsore should also be aware that his or her sponsor has other responsibilities as well.</li> </ul>			
Q - When you first sobered up how did you approach alcoholics and did you change that approach? A - I took off to cure alcoholics wholesale. It was twinjet propulsion; difficulties meant nothing. The vast conceit of my project never occurred to me. I pressed my assault for six months; my home was filled with alcoholics. Harangues with scores produced not the slightest result. None of them got it. Disappointingly, my friend of the kitchen table, who was sicker than I realized, took little interest in other alcoholics. This fact	<ul> <li>recognize his inadequacies and be ready to refer his charge onto a more experience member.</li> <li>(11) SOBRIETY is the only matter on which a sponsor can claim any expertise. He should not see himself as an all-around expert on psychiatry, domestic problems, employment, diet and medical matters. A wise sponsor is acutely aware of where his expertise ends and where other people's start.</li> <li>The Reviver (an Australian AA publication) October 1983</li> </ul>			
may have caused his endless backslides later on. For I had found that working with alcoholics had a huge bearing on my own sobriety. But why wouldn't any of my new prospects sober up? Slowly the bugs came to light. Like a religious crank, I was obsessed with the idea that everybody must have a "spiritual experience" just like mine. I 'd forgotten that there were many varieties. So my brother alcoholics just stared incredulously or kidded me about my "hot flash." This had spoiled the potent identification so easy to get with them. I had turned evangelist. Clearly the deal had to be streamlined. What came to me in six minutes might require six months in others. It was to be learned that words are things, that one must be prudent. It was also certain that something ailed the deflationary technique. It definitely lacked wallop. Reasoning that the alcoholic's "hex" or compulsion, must issue from some deep level, it followed that	touch the alcoholic until his underlying situation was made ready. Fortunately, all the tools were right at hand. You doctors supplied them. The emphasis was shifted from "sin" to "sickness" - the "fatal malady," alcoholism. We quoted doctors that alcoholism was more lethal than cancer; that it consisted of an obsession of the mind coupled to increasing body sensitivity. These were our twin ogres of madness and death. We leaned heavily on Dr. Jung's statement of how hopeless the condition could be and then poured that devastating dose into every drunk
