### Will A. A. Ever Have A Personal Government?

IT WORKS....FOR ME

The answer to this question is almost surely "no." That is the clear verdict of our experience. To begin with, each, A. A. has been an individual who, because of his alcoholism, could seldom govern himself. Nor could any other human being govern the alcoholic's obsession to drink, his drive to have things his own way. Time out of mind, families, friends, employers, doctors, clergymen, and judges have tried their hand at disciplining alcoholics. Almost without exception the failure to accomplish anything by coercion has been complete. Yet we alcoholics can be led, we can be inspired: coming into A. A. we can, and we gladly do, yield to the will of God. Hence it is not strange that the only real authority to be found in A. A. is that of spiritual principle. It is never personal authority. Our unreasonable individualism (egocentricity if you like) was, of course, the main reason we all failed in life and betook ourselves to alcohol. When we couldn't coerce others into conformity with our own plans and desires, we drank. When others tried to coerce us, we also drank. Though now sober, we still have a strong hangover of these early traits which caused us to resist authority. Therein probably hangs a clue to our lack of personal government in A. A.: no dues, no rules and regulations, no demand that alcoholics conform to A. A. principles, no one set in personal authority over anyone else. Though no sterling virtue, our aversion to obedience does pretty well guarantee us freedom from personal domination of any kind. Still it is a fact that most of us do follow, in our personal lives, the Twelve Suggested Steps to recovery. But we do this from choice. We prefer recovery to death. Then, little by little, we perceive the spiritual basis of life is the best. We conform because we want to. Likewise, most A. A. groups become willing to follow the "Twelve Points of Tradition to Assure Our Future." The groups are willing to avoid controversy over outside issues such as political reform or religion: they stick to their single purpose of helping alcoholics to recover; they increasingly rely on self-support rather than outside charity. More and more do they insist on modesty and anonymity in their public relations. The A. A. groups follow these other traditional principles for the very same reason that the individual A. A. follows the Twelve Steps to recovery Groups see they would disintegrate if they didn't and they soon discover that adherence to our tradition and experience is the

foundation for a happier and more effective group life. Nowhere in A. A. is there to be seen any constituted human authority that can compel an A. A. Group to do anything Some A. I appreciate this program especially because it is usable in an everyday fashion. Not mighty sounding mottoes and creeds to be hung on the wall, nor pledges of allegiance to unattainable. futuristic goals. Not principles and practices for which we must be willing to die...but principles by which we can live...and enjoy living. Possibly the greatest tribute is the very simple, often-repeated one: it works. For me. If a person is collection-minded, I suppose he could gather a sizeable bunch of definitions for AA. All partly right; but no single one all-encompassing. Because AA is not static...it is never finished. AA is a process, always dynamic and alive. And a little bit different to each person because each person is a little bit different from the other. Now just the other day, a sentence fairly leaped out of a page I was reading. A nearly perfect explanation of AA. it seemed to me. It went like this: "A life's work, in the sweat and agony of the human spirit. Not for glory and least of all for profit. But to create something of the human spirit that did not exist before." A life's work...to create something that did not exist before...And even as we make occasions to acknowledge the beginnings, to view the accomplishments, it is partly to place them on the larger map of progression, the better to contemplate the whole of it. And perhaps also to remind ourselves that we have progressed. through teach-ability. That we have learned from others. With a little imagination, you can trace the foundations of AA principles pretty far back. About 2700 years ago, the Olympic games came into being. Originally not all athletic in nature, among the events devised was the relay race. In this, participants would each cover just a part of a course, then hand a torch or scroll to another waiting along the way. And the new person would continue. Individual efforts and attainments were important, but teamwork and cooperation were of greater importance. And victory belonged to the group. Possibly AA pioneers...in St. Paul and elsewhere...may have thought there were elements of the marathon and obstacle racing mixed up in this, too. In these respects, time has brought some changes. How fortunate we are today. We have only to open a hand (and a mind) and the way toward solution of our own problems is pointed out, step by step. Ours to use if we choose. With experience and others standing by, ready to lend strength until our own is great enough to carry us forward. To that which did not exist before. This is not to say individual problems are less harrowing today, but assuredly they are more easily borne and worked out when they are shared; when examples are readily available. Suddenly we are not alone with our confusions and perplexities, and we come to know a desire to express our thankfulness by relaying the message to still more. In this simple manner, AA evolution and scope expanded themselves. As in the days of ancient Greece, individual efforts are important, but coordinated, cooperative

We can supplu information and literature; we can usually tell how the majority of A. A.'s feel about our current problems; we can assist new groups to start, giving advice if asked; we can look after the over-all A. A. public relations; we can sometimes mediate difficulties. Similarly, the editors of our monthly journal, The A. A. Grapevine, believe themselves simply a mirror of current A. A., life and thought. Serving purely as such, they cannot rule or propagandize. So, also, the trustees of The Aloholic Foundation (our A. A. general service committee) is best remembered for his volunteer work in prisons, youth know themselves to be simple custodians, custodians who homes, and general service work as a long standing friend of guarantee the effectiveness of the A. A. General Office and The A. A. Grapevine and who are the repository of our general funds and Traditions—caretakers only. It is most clearly apparent that, even here at the very center of A. So long as we avoid any menacing accumulation of wealth or the growth of personal government at these centers, we cannot go astray. While wealth and authority lie at the foundation of many a noble institution, we of A. A. now apprehend, and thoroughly well, that these things are not for us. Have we not found that one man's meat is often another man's poison? Shall we not do well if, instead, we can cling in some part to the

## NOTES FROM INSIDE THE CENTRAL OFFICE

August 9th at approximately 5:00 pm during a thunderstorm we lost power to the lights. At 6:00 pm we pulled some chairs into the main office room started the Board Meeting in the dark. Al opened the meeting in the usual matter asking everyone to turn down their cell phones and this was followed by the Serenity Prayer. Rob read the July minutes, there were no questions and the minutes were approved as read. Al noted that Carrie our accountant and Patti our former auditor were also present to answer some accounting questions requested by some Board members from the July meeting. The question basically was how to set up an account to use the money from the sell of literature to re-buy more literature and the money bought in from contributions to pay the Office expenses. It was noted that literature is but one function of the Central Office but the primary reason for the Central Office is keeping the Office open and the telephones operational for the still suffering alcoholic who may need our help. Discussion moved into the reasons we cashed in one of our CD's from our Prudent Reserve, how to get those Groups that don't contribute to Central Office to start contributing, how to inform members of the Birthday Plan, and how to get Groups interested in holding All Groups Meetings as a fund-raiser for Central Office. One member thought maybe doing a monthly raffle would be a good idea. Al bought up the point that we needed to start getting committees formed and everything started for our Annual Tri-County Central Anniversary Dinner and Speaker Meeting. It was decided to have a Lasagna Dinner and that tickets should be \$10.00. At the Council meeting Bob and Lyle from the Sincerity Group, Linda from the Step Sisters in Sobriety Group and Lorie from the Reflections Group were welcomed in as new Central Office Reps. The main discussions were on the Anniversary Dinner and ways to get groups to contribute to the Central Office.
