A DIFFERENT KIND OF CHRISTMAS FEELING

I walked into a meeting the other night, and a young man who qualified made me think about these Christmas holidays of ours. I got sober after my first AA meeting, on New Year's Day in 1965. This holiday week has remained an emotional problem for me ever since. I went into a psycho ward on New Year's Eve and woke up in a straitjacket on New Year's Day. I met a psychiatrist who listened patiently while I read him my list of woes. I desperately wanted a hyphenated diagnosis that would enable me to drink justifiably ever after. I insisted I was crazy. He looked unimpressed. He said, "You may be, but that will never kill you. Your drinking will. Go to AA." At beginners meetings, I spent my first sober time in years. I was absolutely convinced that my awful habit had put me in the position of a social outcast who would now spend his life beating tambourines for sanctity and his breast for forgiveness. Life would be dreary, dry, and downright penitential. Of course, this has not happened. Life is filled with joy, work I love, and people, people, people. Oh, the marvelous people!—both in and out of AA. Still...Christmas carols, jolly trees, and that emotional binge called the holiday spirit do intimidate me. It's hard not to see it all as an unnatural high, from which I must eventually descend sharply. Everyone around says. "Ho, ho, ho," and I feel like, "Oh, no, no, no." The young speaker I refer to was talking from a newer vantage point than mine. He had been sober eighteen months and told how he reached his bottom. He said he had drunk himself into a major depression that had gone on for a long time, perhaps five years. He was twenty-five and due at his parents' home for Christmas Eve. On his way, he stopped off at a place called Copake Falls, N.Y. It was a state park and deserted at that time of the year. He parked his car and went to the top of the mountain. The view was breathtaking, but he did not enjoy it. He looked at the valley below, where a brook flowed. He hardly saw the valley or heard the brook. Snow began to fall. He sat down and let the powdery flakes accumulate on him. He looked at the gray sky and said quietly, "I don't believe in you, God. But if You are there...please take my life." In the next eight weeks, he attempted suicide twice. Each time, AA was recommended to him by a psychiatrist. It did not take the first time. Finally, it did. He went back to the park in the spring. The valley and his private mountain were alive with green. He looked at the blue sky and said, "I do believe in You, God. I know You are there. And thanks for my life." I spoke to this man after the meeting. He told me that he could not get over the wondrous things that were happening to him in AA: sleeping at night, friends, love, work he enjoys, serenity, serenity, serenity. He described it all in glowing terms. The things he described were all ordinary—the things that make up most of life. I realized that I had done a lot of impact drinking and was still guilty of impact thinking. What I wanted from the holiday season was a wallop, a bang, a parade, an emotional high. What this young man wanted was a quiet, happy, spiritual feeling. A feeling that says you are a whole person. A feeling that says there is some sort of power for good at work and it's Continued on page 3

In total, TBAIC raised \$580 from the tournament. Majority of the monies came from the registration for 8 teams and a large 50/50 raffle that was over \$140. I don't have to feel inside the way Santa Claus looks outside. I can calmly go to meetings and party with loved ones on coffee. I can reflect joyfully. I can select sober companions. This hullabaloo all started with a naked baby who was to be a carpenter and itinerant rabbi. He would have been aghast if He knew His birthday was to upset me all these twenty-four hours later. The fact that I crashed around that date is not His fault. This year, I intend to be comfortable at the holidays. I will think of the comfort in my young friend's voice when he told his before-and-after story of the mountaintop, and I will say, "I believe in You. I know You're there. Thanks for my life, and happy birthday."

PUTTING UP WITH RIDICULOUS IDEAS

Recently, I read this definition of tolerance: the ability to listen to other people's views-after all, they're entitled to their ridiculous ideas. It started a train of thought on the subject. A week or ten days and two AA meetings later, I reluctantly decided that I must practice my tolerance hardest and most often at, of all places, AA meetings. The speaker tonight was an AA member that I love but frequently disagree with. When he was introduced as the main speaker, my little bit of tolerance went right up in smoke. For ten or fifteen minutes, I wallowed in self-pity and resentment. The reasons are immaterial. I did it, and I realized my attitude was wrong. Good thinking started to return after I said the Serenity Prayer two or three times, remembering that the speaker, too, was entitled to his "ridiculous ideas," that he was obviously telling his story and no one else's. When I looked around the room, I noticed people who were actually enjoying his talk, listening carefully to every word. I remembered hearing, "There are no bad AA meetings—some are just better than others." That was a few years ago, but it is as true now as it was then. Whether at a speakers meeting or a discussion group, I must always fall back on the Serenity Prayer when I start to be impatient, critical, and intolerant, AA meetings were not, are not, and never will be designed for my mood of the day. By allowing others to express their "ridiculous ideas," I not only will improve my tolerance but might even find the answer to something that is troubling me.

SOBRIETY IS THE FRINGE BENEFIT

For several years now, I've been hearing—and sometimes saving—from the podium that the important reward of working the AA program thoroughly is staying sober; and that the "fringe benefits" will come with time. Speakers I heard as a newcomer seemed to feel that those fringe benefits were such things as getting back in "the big bed," getting a better job, new car, new house, and new clothes, and making new friends. I could appreciate such aims only vicariously, since I had no complaints about my job, my car, my house, or my clothes and wasn't particularly interested in getting back into a particular bed. But I felt I was identifying with those speakers just by believing what they believed—that the desirable things in life, the fringe benefits of sobriety, would come to successful workers of the AA program in time. It seems quite clear to me now, however, that sobriety itself is the fringe benefit; that one does not attain peace of mind, self-respect, gratitude, and love of one's fellowmen merely by staying sober. Exactly the reverse! It is through attaining peace of mind, self-respect, gratitude, and love of one's fellowmen that one attains the fringe benefit of sobriety. Before you say "Nonsense!" (or whatever else you were going to say), pick up Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions. Wherever you start to read, the message is the same—not that staying sober will make you a better person, but that becoming a better person will keep you sober! Those who cry, "Get well before you get good" have missed the point entirely. Well is good. And in order to stay well (remove the obsession to drink), you have to try to become good (a better person). We all know long-term AA's whose sobriety is still tenuous, despite their years in the program. Some still resent the fact that they can't drink almost as much as they enjoy the knowledge that they don't have to. For them, the Twelve Steps to remove the obsession to drink haven't worked yet. Or the reverse is true: In most cases, it turns out that those sour old-timers haven't worked the Twelve Steps. And it's a relief to have found that out, by asking many directly. To me, the knowledge that the Twelve Steps do work is important. I could not enjoy the kind of sobriety that let me stay the kind of person I was when I came into the AA program. Today, I don't envy drinkers—even those who can drink in safety. I see alcohol as a depressant and a disorienter. I feel that those who drink it are losing, rather than gaining, something. And though they may feel that loss to be a pleasant, euphoric process, I don't have to agree with them. What I do have to do is work at being a better person than I was yesterday. That in itself is the basic reward of working the AA program. And, as a fringe benefit, I'll gain another day of rewarding sobriety.

SELF-SUPPORT-October 2012

© Back in 2004 our annual income was around \$59,000.00 and our annual expenses were around \$54,000.00. Today we have almost doubled both of these amounts. Why? That's easy. More Groups, more people in AA. In 1998 we had 174 Groups in the Hillsborough/ East Pasco area. That was 364 meetings per week in our area. Today in October of 2012 we have 228 Groups with 600 meetings a week. Although we have lost some groups in the past year, that's still a lot of meetings and that's still a lot of Groups wanting material and more groups are being formed as we speak. This year to date contributions from Groups (October, 2012) have totaled \$61,410.45 for the year. That accounts for what 134 Groups in our area have contributed plus the 75 AA'er's who contributed \$1310.95 in contributions anonymously and the \$1000.00 from the Old School Group's Anniversary Dinner and the \$3,055.00 minus \$984.94 in expenses we generated from ticket sales, the 7th Tradition Basket and a raffle at our Anniversary Dinner and the \$1,150.00 generated from Raffle Tickets for the First Edition Big Book we are raffling off at our first ever Founders Day Event. And the \$ 272.00 generated from the 12 Step Workshop hosted by the 164 Group and the \$1400.00 from the All Groups meeting hosted by the Keystone Group and the \$91.87 from the All Groups meeting hosted by the Cardinal Group. And the \$1500.00 donated to us from the Soberstock event. And the \$36.30 from the Women's Perspective Conference. And the \$236.00 from the 10 members who have participated in the Birthday Plan thus far. Our Literature sales for October bought in \$5,576.64 plus \$10.00 in Newsletter subscriptions. Contributions were \$5,599.89. Our total income for October was \$11,186.53. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,770.49. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our October income left us with a Gross Profit of \$7,416.04. Our Expenses for October were \$7,352.91. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus \$63.13 for the month of October. As I have stated in the past, we are not trying to squeeze you for more money. We know we can always count on you. We just wanted to bring some awareness of our situation to those who may be new to A.A. or new to being a Treasurer or Trusted Servant to their Group or to those who do not understand what the 7th Tradition and Self-Supporting means. It's the nature of the beast...as our AA membership continues to grow in the Tampa Bay area, the demand for more and more material and services continue to expand and we have to try and strive to keep up with the demand. That is only possible with your continued support through your contributions, special events that groups put on for the benefit of Central Office and the literature sales. That's why we have started including this report in the newsletter, so you can see how we are doing and what's needed on a monthly basis. Thank You for your Support.
