# MY HIGHER POWER—THE LIGHT BULB In their sincere and honest attempt to maintain a "hands off"

From the very beginning, Alcoholics Anonymous wasted no time nor effort in trying to determine the why of alcoholism or what causes the phenomenon. We were simply advised to accept the fact of our illness and get on with the recovery program. Not too many days gone by, I found myself thinking, "Why me?" It was not the old "Why me?" prompted by self-pity, but the realization that of all the people who were still suffering, somehow I was given sobriety. With an absolutely honest appraisal, I could in no way understand why I had been selected to enjoy the blessings of our sober life when people all around were still in the darkness of alcoholism. I found the answer in the very Steps of recovery I was encouraged to take, in the order they were written. The prayer in the Third Step in the Big Book held the key: "Take away my difficulties, that victory over them may bear witness to those I would help..." Perhaps there was a reason. Just maybe, a purpose could be found right here. Soon, I was engulfed with the problems of defects and inventory. The purpose faded for a while, until I carefully read Step Seven. I believe I was at the time in desperate need to determine what was meant by humility and to just what degree one could humbly measure one's progress in that area. In those days, too, we argued a lot about how God was going to remove those defects, and we worried a lot while discussing the "very serious" difference between defects and shortcomings. There were those words in the prayer mentioned in the Big Book discussion of Step Six:"my usefulness to You and my fellows." The reason for my very existence must be to serve. Later on, that clearly defined:"Our real purpose is to fit ourselves to be of maximum service to God and the people about us.' Service to God and my fellows is the reason I am given sobriety. and there is no other reason. If I fail to serve, my purpose in life will be unfulfilled, and no doubt life itself will be taken away. Long ago, I stopped praying for sobriety, because perhaps my Maker might think, "If he does not know what he has got, why, I might as well take it back." Sooner or later, all our prayers might change from "What can You give to me?" to "What have You got for me to do?" How best can I serve? I have always felt that if Recovery has taken place, Unity and Service must followcompleting the Three Legacies left to us by AA's co-founders However, if Recovery is to be available in the group, Unity and Service must be part of that group. So which really comes first? Yet, for some unexplained reason, the word service is not well received in our Fellowship. Put on a service meeting, and the attendance is spare. I wonder how many people would attend if a Regional Forum was called a "regional service meeting"? People talk about "getting involved in service." Service is looked upon in many places as something separate and to be endured only by a few. I believe deeply in the recovery miracle of our program. I have experienced that recovery in my life. I believe we have a great obligation to tell all people that we have a program of recovery that works. In many places, I shock our own members by saving I have recovered. I am no longer sick. I can no longer use the illness of alcoholism as an excuse for Continued on page 3

policy regarding fellow members' religious beliefs and perhaps sensitivities, our founding fathers exercised gentle wisdom and proffered spiritual freedom. No one, it was rightly thought should be permitted to impose their own religious concepts and beliefs upon any other member of the fellowship. The area was much too important to the prospective recoveree to be tampered with by moral man. The very life of the prospect depends, ultimately, upon his or her "personal relationship" with a "Power greater than themselves." The notion was valid in the Program's earlier days—and it still is! In no way, shape or form, however, was the idea conceived to avoid guiding our beloved newcomer along the path of spiritual progress. Ouite the contrary, our whole purpose as recovered alcoholics, was and is to help the next person achieve sobriety. If that person is a **real** alcoholic his only hope is God. So in its most basic and simplest terms our only real purpose is to help the still-suffering alcoholic to find God. A loving God, a healing God is the alcoholic's only real hope. This is no easy task. A vast array of difficulties present themselves to thwart the new person on his journey. The foremost adversary, of course, is the illness itself. It seems that many, many alcoholics have a fierce, emotionally charged resistance to accepting any dependency upon a Power which to them, may seem an abstract and remotely distant concept. This internal resistance is most effectively broken down by the potential recoveree's initial desperation. "It seems such a shame that today's A.A. actually encourages the newcomer to avoid reaping the blessings of that desperation.) If intense enough and deep enough, this emotional "bottom" will be the very propellent the prospect needs to thrust him into the recovery process offered by A.A. through its 12 steps. Another stumbling block, which many people who are new to the Program are currently encountering, is us! We seem to be full of fear as regarding the responsibility we have been given in the area of spiritual guidance. We shirk this responsibility by evasiveness or by the direct side-stepping of the issue by such statements as, "its God as **you** understand Him" and its up to you to come to your own conclusions." So the newcomer is left to his own devices. He is expected to arrive, alone and unguided, at a relationship with his Creator. One of the most powerful and hope-filled statements to be found in the entire text of Alcoholics **Anonymous** can be found on page 25. "The great fact is just this, and nothing less: That we have had deep and effective spiritual experiences which have revolutionized our whole attitude toward life, toward our fellows and towards God's universe. The central fact of our lives today is the absolute certainty that our creator has entered into our hearts and lives in a way which is indeed miraculous. He has commenced to accomplish those things for us which we could never do for ourselves." Are we, today. So far removed from our founders' results of our recovery program that these words are nothing more than a "nice thought" or an exaggeration due to artificially elated emotions? The May 2013 meeting of the T.B.A.I.C. was opened by Chair Bobby B. Bobby gave a brief verbal Treasures report from Jerimiah T. who was unable to attend. Bobby was also in receipt of two letters. One, from a new correctional facility asking for guidance in obtaining materials for inmates. The second letter involves completion of a prerelease packet from an inmate in the Okeechobee Correctional facility. Buddy H will assist with the response to the two requests. Also, The Men's Bridge the Gap position will now be handled by Curtis B.

John B. (813.471.8655) asked that the message be passed along that the Women's DACCO facility's (4422 East Columbus) Wednesday night meeting (The H.O.W. Group) at 6 pm is an open meeting and encourages participation of more outside women to share their experiences and give the residence an opportunity to be in contact with potential sponsors.

The DACCO Men's (R-2) Monday 6:45 PM night meeting could use additional support to give new prospective to the residence. Eventually the two Dacco Men's facilities will be combined in to one location. The current R-2 location will become part of a transitional re-entry program for recent releases of the prison system and volunteers will be needed to offer meetings once this takes place. More updates will be given when information is received from DACCO.

Buddy H. said the local jails are being covered. Buddy is working with Mark G. with the scheduling conflict at the Drew Park Detox location. Funds are being made available to purchases needed materials.

Nancy B. is working with Faulkenburg to resolve a scheduling problem with the women's Sunday night meeting. The meeting may be changed to a different time or split into two meetings on another day.

Mark B. will be meeting with a DACCO representative on the new detox that opened at the women's facility to determine their needs for meetings and AA volunteer positions. Mark is also working on updating the schedule and location information for the area detoxes and to keep the information as current as possible.

Dick D. asked to remind groups of the Pink Can program which is big part in funding the purchase of materials needed for the T.B.A.I.C. programs.

The upcoming Steps to Freedom event June 22, 2013 is a fund raising event for T.B.A.I.C. and needs everyones support.

Our next meeting will be on Saturday June 8. This is an open meeting for anyone interested in service work and to offer your own experience of what is was like, what happened and how you are able to live a sober life in today's society.

anything. There is a catch, however. If I fail to use my recovery in service to others. I will become sick again. So service becomes not only the reason for recovery, but the only way there is to maintain our recovery. When I look back on how our society outside of our Fellowship treated the alcoholic at the time of my coming to AA, I can see some progress. In all honestly, however, I don't believe we are making much progress in developing new treatment methods that will greatly reduce the numbers who suffer so tragically and do not reach us. More than ever, we have a tremendous responsibility to carry our message. More than ever, we have to realize that it is we who have to care. Look, if you will, at the attitude in society today. Example: Recently, tremendous strides were announced in the treatment of heart disease. This breakthrough was so great that death from recurrent heart attacks could be reduced by fifty percent. This news did not even rate a cover story. Newsweek carried a feature story that week on "Sex on Television." More and more, we respond only to what is happening to us. So let's not expect that even in the face of our current epidemic of alcoholism, there is going to be a great public outcry. The recovery of millions of alcoholics depends upon us. That is an obligation, a responsibility that is mind-boggling. Alcoholics Anonymous is truly a "becon light of hope for mankind." If each member works through the group—through recovery to service—we cannot number the lives that can be touched. Few human beings will ever enjoy the privilege that is ours. At first, I did not even know we had a Third Legacy. Then I became aware that people who were active in serving the Fellowship were the very people I thought of when I heard the words "If you want what we have...." Their example and that of countless others have led me in my journey with this great Fellowship. People like Bern Smith (one of AA's early nonalcoholic trustees) believed in giving their all. Remember Bern saying, "When they put me on the scrap heap of life, I want to be all used up." Many times, my sponsor and I have been criticized by our mutual friends outside of AA for doing what we do: nearly every weekend away from home and family: hours on end spent in airports. We discuss this, and every time we do, we come up with the same answer. We see what happens to people who do "retire," and we always say we had best keep doing what we are doing. You know, we haven't had to drink for a total of forty -six years between us. No one will ever be able to say it any better than, nor, in fact, nearly as well as our co-founder Bill. He summed it up when he wrote: "God will constantly disclose more to you and to us. Ask Him in your morning meditation what you can do each day for the man who is still sick."

we don't have." We cannot share awareness we don't have. Cannot give guidance we have never gotten. We cannot share a vision of a God we have never seen. Our lack, thereby, becomes the newcomer's and he may die because of it! Our resistance becomes his license. In his liquor befogged mind he does not seek and experience God but begins to "create" one. It's no wonder his dryness becomes so barren that in a short while he returns to drink. His "Higher Power" was a light bulb! (No joke. We have heard this concept voiced more than once, and not only by a newcomer!) Or perhaps this power greater than himself was a chair, or a wall or even a mere mortal sponsor. A quick glance at the top of page 93 of the "Big Book" makes instantly clear a very important qualification in the concept of (...as you understand Him." and that is: "He can choose any conception he like, PROVIDED IT MAKES SENSE TO HIM." Power greater than himself—a light bulb? A simple flick of a switch turns off that power. A wall? Not so powerful when confronted with a bulldozer. A chair? An axe can make quick kindling of that higher power. A sponsor then? If he fails to perfect his spiritual life, his old foe alcohol is sure to reclaim him. So he won't do very well as a greater power. How about a whole group? Possibly for someone else, but not for us. If one person who is powerless over alcohol, and another, and another, we would have a group of people who are powerless over alcohol. We do not have a group of people who ARE POWERFUL over alcohol. Yet they do not drink! They have gained access to something more powerful than alcohol. It was never intended that phrases such as "higher power." "power greater than ourselves," or "as we understood Him" were created as an enabling device to justify our membership's continued avoidance of a connection with our Creator. Page 46 of the AA book says, "We found that as soon as we were able to lay aside prejudice and express even a willingness to believe in a Power greater than ourselves, we commenced to get results, even though it was impossible for any of us to fully define or comprehend that power which is God." Again, "...that Power, which is God." Our founders apparently held no reservations whatsoever, with Who was dealing with them. Perhaps we would be well advised to think twice before we attempt any ourselves. Alcoholics Anonymous is not allied with any religion, as we well know. But it is allied with God, "for our very lives as ex-problem drinkers depend upon it." It is allied with spirituality, for despite what our preamble states, A.A. is not a "fellowship," it is a spiritual way of life. It is our most earnest desire that no one reading this feel that we are trying to impose any presentation of God of His nature on anyone. Our real hope is that a reader may be jolted from a position of complacency or spiritual evasion and get about the business of recovery.

### SELF-SUPPORT-APRIL 2013

© Back in 2004 our annual income was around \$59,000.00 and our annual expenses were around \$54,000.00. Today we have almost doubled both of these amounts. Why? That's easy. More Groups, more people in AA. In 1998 we had 174 Groups in the Hillsborough/East Pasco area. That was 364 meetings per week in our area. Today in APRIL of 2013 we have 223 Groups with 590 meetings a week. Although we may lose some groups, others spring up just as fast, that's still a lot of meetings and that's still a lot of Groups wanting material. This year to date contributions from Groups (April, 2013) have totaled \$23,702.43 for the year. That accounts for what 89 Groups out of 223 Groups in our area have contributed the 17 AAer's who contributed \$462.88 in contributions anonymously and and the 43641.00 we generated from ticket sales, the 7th Tradition Basket and a raffle at our Anniversary Dinner. And the \$205.00 from the 12 members who have participated in the Birthday Plan thus far. Also the \$589.00 from the Old School Group Anniversary Dinner and the \$305.00 from the 164 Group's 12 Step Workshop and the \$1700.00 from the Keystone Group's All Groups meeting in March. Our Literature sales for March bought in \$5,994.72 plus \$85.00 in Newsletter subscriptions. And the \$110.00 for the upcoming Founders Day Event. Contributions were \$5,153.56. Our total income for April was \$12,062.88. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$4,762.50. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our April income left us with a Gross Profit of \$7,300.38. Our Expenses for April were \$7,293.23. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of \$7.15 for the month of April.
