PASSING THE BASKET OR PASSING THE BUCK?

We Pay Our Own Way

When I was newly sober in AA, fourteen years ago, I seldom attended a meeting without taking a pamphlet to read. I always had at least two cups of coffee, and if there was anything to eat, I ate. When the basket passed, I always put a quarter in it—for two people, my wife and I. If we could truly stretch a dollar as far as I must have thought we could, the financial world would be beating a path to our doorsteps to learn AA's remarkable brand of economics. Most of us decry the fact that more than forty percent of groups do not support the Fellowship. When it comes to AA's being self-supporting, many fail to recognize our one important aspect. If we aren't even willing to pay our own way at a meeting, how can we expect a group to support the Fellowship? What we need to realize is that we are the groups, and we are Alcoholics Anonymous. I have seen AAs spend more money at a coffee shop than they would ever think of putting in the collection at a meeting. Early in my sobriety, it was explained that it was imperative for me to get my priorities in order. Learning to become responsible was one of them. This financial buck-passing certainly seems to run counter to responsibility. If we want "the hand of AA always to be there," we each need to assume our own share of responsibility. If money and spirituality do mix in the basket, as the "Twelve and Twelve" says, then how much better they will blend when money is used to perpetuate AA by making more Twelfth Step work possible. We, who have had so much given to us freely—in love, with no strings attached—sometimes forget that this also is an area where we have to give it away to keep it. One of the promises in the Big Book is freedom from "fear of economic insecurity". Long ago. one of my sponsors suggested that if I stayed sober and tried to live along spiritual lines, my needs would always be met. Today, I can honestly say that never has there been an instance where I have given of myself, financially or otherwise, and have not been compensated many times over. Our family has never lacked anything because we accepted our responsibility to help carry the message. God has given each of us a share of the responsibility. He has given each of us the tools to work with and the ability to use them. Let's all of us assume our shares so that we may all reap ever-increasingly the fruits of selflessness and love in service to our Fellowship.

September 17—The Eye Opener

Over the years, I've been privileged to hear a number of AAs tell why the Traditions were drafted and why adherence to them is of continuing importance to the AA Fellowship. Early in my AA life, I was told that everything in the book Alcoholics Anonymous is there for a reason and could be used in developing and practicing a personal "program." And that included the Traditions, both the short form, which is read at many meetings, and the long form, which is read at very few meetings. Consequently, in time I came to accept the long form as the way to study and apply the Traditions as an integral part of my program. As I understand it, after Bill W. introduced the Traditions in the long form in a1946 Grapevine article, some AAs, including Dr. Bob, argued that their length might lead some to think they are to be considered more important than the Steps. It was also suggested that some members were so damaged by boozing that they'd have difficulty comprehending the long form. So, the very simplified short form was drafted in 1947, refined over the next year or so, and adopted at the first International AA Convention in 1950. But, just so there'd be a ready reference to what the Traditions are really all about, it was decided to print the long form as well as the short form in the Big Book. As far as I can tell, nowhere is the variance between short and long forms more pronounced than in Tradition Seven. The short form is nothing if not succinct: "Every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions." The long form provides, with indepth clarity, precisely what Tradition Seven encompasses and is meant to accomplish: "The AA groups themselves ought to be fully self-supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligation whatever, is unwise. Then, too, we view with much concern those AA treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated AA purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority." The long form leaves little room for wonder as to what Tradition Seven is all about. Too, it gives added emphasis to some things found elsewhere in the Traditions. For example, public solicitation of funds using the AA name affects other groups and AA as a whole, and implies affiliation or endorsement, so it violates Traditions Four and Six, as well as Tradition Seven. There are also close ties between all of these and Concept XI and Warranties 1 and 2 of Concept XII of the Twelve Concepts for World Service in The AA Service Manual. Tradition Seven, like others, can benefit individual growth as well as group strength, most notably via the tenet that we pay our Continued on page 3

way. That's part of the conversion from the way we were to the way we are now, and an example of the heartening contradiction that dependence upon AA bolsters independence. Sobriety can't be bought; there are no strings attached; no one is required to contribute money in AA. Yet, it is clear that self-support enhances self-respect. Here are some other Tradition Seven observations: The conversion from irresponsible spender while drinking to fiscal watchdog in sobriety seems to afflict some AAs with a dose of avariciousness. It didn't occur to me for some time, for example, that my dollar-in-the-kitty habit ignored inflation. So, I changed my ways in that regard, giving more to meetings that practiced the 60-30-10 plan endorsed by this area. Too, my AA wife and I became supporting members of our local central office—giving what we could when we could to that lifesaving operation. We've been involved with meetings where the job of treasurer is given to newcomers under the pretext, "It's good for 'em." Poppycock! That's usually a means of evading personal involvement. And as a rule, it is not good for newcomers, who often aren't yet able to balance their own checkbooks, to be given responsibility for a meeting's or group's finances. That can create an unnecessary sink-or-swim situation for someone just learning to tread water. Some not-sonew members aren't good choices for treasurer, either. We've known some who've fouled up books something awful-and a few who absconded with funds. Most of them were "volunteered" for the job, by the way. This matter of "futile disputes over...money"—have you been to a local central service or intergroup meeting lately? They get lively when money's the topic. It's been the experience in our neck of the woods that the central office is able to maintain a prudent reserve, and if finances get short, the groups respond with increased contributions. The key to this usually bright financial picture has been and always will be participation, by individuals through their groups, by groups through their central office or intergroup representatives, and by constant attention by paid and volunteer staffers to the proper expenditures and controls of AA funds. In our area, the dangers of "public solicitation of funds using the name of Alcoholics Anonymous" are lessen by strict adherence to and consistent mention of the noendorsement/ nonaffiliation policy established in Tradition Six. Vigilance on this is particularly essential in a sector the size of the Los Angeles area of AA, wherein the Fellowship has become the main "aftercare" resource for an ever-growing number of treatment facilities. By the way, the central office here returns all contributions from sources that do not comply with the guidelines spelled out in "The AA Group" pamphlet. In other words, not a true AA meeting. We pay our own way!

SELF-SUPPORT-AUGUST, 2013

© Back in 2004 our annual income was around \$59,000.00 and our annual expenses were around \$54,000.00. Today we have almost doubled both of these amounts. Why? That's easy. More Groups, more people in AA. In 1998 we had 174 Groups in the Hillsborough/East Pasco area. That was 364 meetings per week in our area. Today in JULY of 2013 we have 221 Groups with 553 meetings a week. There are 10 Spanish Groups with 35 meetings a week. Brandon has 39 Groups with 83 meetings a week. Carrollwood has 9 Groups with 10 meetings a week. Central Tampa has 25 Groups with 67 meetings a week. Wesley Chapel/East Pasco has 16 Groups with 55 meetings a week. Odessa/Lutz, west of Dale Mabry has 10 Groups with 10 meetings a week. Lutz/Land-o-Lakes east of Dale Mabry has 3 Groups with 52 meetings a week. Plant City has 10 Groups with 17 meetings a week. Sun City/Ruskin/ Apollo Beach has 22 Groups with 42 meetings a week. Seminole has 6 Groups with 50 meetings a week. South Tampa has 42 Groups with 104 meetings a week. Temple Terrace has 19 Groups with 40 meetings a week and Town & Country has 10 Groups with 20 meetings a week. Although we may lose some groups, others spring up just as fast, that's still a lot of meetings and that's still a lot of Groups wanting material. The year to date contributions from Groups (August 2013) have totaled \$46,950.18 for the year. That accounts for what 129 Groups out of 221 Groups in our area have contributed plus the 47 AAer's who contributed \$823.38 in contributions anonymously and the 43641.00 we generated from ticket sales, the 7th Tradition Basket and a raffle at our Anniversary Dinner. And the \$604.00 from the 28 members who have participated in the Birthday Plan thus far. Also the \$589.00 from the Old School Group Anniversary Dinner and the \$305.00 from the 164 Group's 12 Step Workshop and the \$1700.00 from the Keystone Group's All Groups meeting in March. And the \$1166.50 generated from our Founders Day Event and the \$506.60 from the Friday Night Lights Group's Movie Night and the \$525.00 from the Cardinal Groups All Groups event and the \$320.00 from the Memorial Day Picnic hosted by the Wellspring Group, Sunshine Group and the Wednesday Night Town & Country Group. Our Literature sales for August bought in \$5,257.85 plus \$15.00 in Newsletter subscriptions. Contributions were \$4,060.69. Our total income for August was \$9,344.66. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,839.60. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our August income left us with a Gross Profit of \$5,505.06. Our Expenses for August were \$5,656.87. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus -\$151.81 for the month of August.
