much in the past about AA's need for the understanding and moral support of physicians and clergy. Bill long ago used the picture of the three-legged milking stool to illustrate this. When any of us tries to do the whole job alone, parts of it are likely to be done badly, and we make cooperation difficult or impossible. We may well hurt those whom we are trying to help. I recently learned of a new member—a month in AA—who had had a heart attack and was taking the medicine that he needed for the pains that came with exertion or excitement. A well-meaning AA member told him to stop taking the pills—that he would get drunk if he continued taking them. He was afraid to go to meetings in case he might have heart pains—and afraid to stay away from meetings because he needed AA. To tell a patient who is taking medication prescribed by a competent physician to stop taking it, or change the dose, or take something else, may probably hurt the patient. It will destroy any friendship that physician may have for AA, as this he would rightly consider irresponsible meddling. I have urged many AAs to identify themselves to the physicians and clergymen who knew them as practicing alcoholics. Several have told me of the change in attitude that has occurred, whicj in some instances has opened hospital doors. We shall need to do much, much more of this, as more and more government-supported treatment facilities are established. The development of a smooth and effective working relationship will not be easy. It will requires a lot of tolerance on their part and on ours. It will require understanding—deep understanding and respect of each other as individuals, so that we can talk through our differences, learning from each other— recognizing and accepting our own limitations and each other's strengths. We, officially, cannot enter into any formal relationship. As individuals, we are needed, provided that we will understand and respect the province of the professionals, and accept their knowledge and competence in that province, at t	of talks—these are some of the ways in which we can develop interest and understanding among those whom we need and who need us. 6—Are there ways to be used to strengthen our communications between present and past General Service Delegates, the General Service Trustees, and the groups? Many of us feel, I am sure, that there isn't enough of us to go around. But let us all use Box 4-5-9, the Grapevine, and all the other ways open to us to keep in touch. Conferences are high spots for all of us. All of this and more will happen if we as individuals live by the program—one day at a time— recognizing the personal pitfalls of halo-polishing, overconfidence, taking the other fellow's inventory rather than our own, resentment, self-pity, and the other traps we know so well. If I have seemed to confuse the challenges of AA as a whole with the challenges to each of us as individuals, it is because of my conviction that the two cannot be separated. What people think and do about AA is made up of what people think about you and me, and the way we have lived the program. Remember the story* of the AA who talked at a meeting for professionals in a hospital and after the meeting introduced herself to the physician who had treated her before she found AA? That doctor sponsored a group in that hospital, and goodness knows how many alcoholics are now recovering as a result of that contact. A convinced professional friend is made for AA. On the other hand, a well-meaning AA persuades a new member under treatment by a friendly physician to stop taking that treatment. The result: There may be no more referrals to AA from <i>that</i> physician. When some of us breaks the anonymity of another, not maliciously but carelessly, AA is hurt. When we, as individuals, live the program with the best guidance we can get in the Eleventh Step, AA is strengthened. ⊙ Today in October of 2017 we have 224 Groups with 565 meetings a week. Contributions in October totaled \$ 3,221.06. That accounts for what 46 Groups out of 224 Groups in our area have contributed in October. Our total income for October was \$7,059.16. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,888.81. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our October income left us with a Gross Profit of \$8,417.32. Our Total Expenses for October were \$8,351.45. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus+\$65.87 for the month of October. This leaves us with a total of minus—\$2,830.29 in the red for the year thus far.
