ACTIVITY IN AND AROUND AA

When experienced A.A. members say that they found “*getting active*” helpful in their recovery from alcoholism, they usually mean getting active in and around A.A. If you want to, you can do that even before you decide whether or not you want to become an A.A. member. You don’t even need anyone’s permission or invitation. In fact, before you make any decision about a drinking problem, it might be a good idea to spend some time around A.A. Don’t worry—just sitting at, and observing, A.A. meetings does not make you an alcoholic or an A.A. member, any more than sitting in a hen house makes you a hen. You can try a sort of “*dry run*” or “*dress rehearsal*” of A.A. first, then decide about “*joining*.” The activities we often use at first in A.A. may seem fairly unimportant, but the results prove them valuable. We might call these things “*ice breakers*,” because they make it easier to feel comfortable around people we do not know. As most A.A. meetings end, you’ll notice that some of those present start putting away the folding chairs, or emptying ashtrays, or carrying empty tea and coffee cups to the kitchen. Join in. You may be surprised at the effect on yourself of such seemingly little chores. You can help wash out the cups and coffeepot, put away literature, and sweep the floor. Helping out with these easy little physical tasks does *not* mean you become the group’s janitor or custodian. Nothing of the sort. From years of doing it and seeing fellow members do it, we know that practically every person happily recovered in A.A. has taken his or her turn at the K.P. or refreshment-and-cleanup detail. The results we have felt from doing these tasks are concrete, beneficial, and usually surprising. In fact, many of us began to feel comfortable around A.A. only when we began to help with these simple acts. And we were even more at ease, and much further away from drinking or the thought of it, when we accepted some small, but specific, regular responsibility—such as bringing the refreshments, helping prepare and serve them, being a greeter on the hospitality committee, or performing other tasks that needed doing. Simply by watching other people, you’ll learn what needs to be done to get ready for the A.A. meeting, and to straighten up afterwards. No one *has* to do such things, of course. In A.A., no one is ever required to do, or not do, anything. But these simple, menial chores and the commitment (*only to ourselves*) to do them faithfully have had unexpectedly good effects on many of us, and still do. They help give some muscle to our sobriety. As you stay around an A.A. group, you’ll observe other tasks that need undertaking. You’ll hear a secretary make announcements and see the treasurer take charge of the contributions basket. Serving in one of those capacities, once you get a little accumulation of non-drinking time (about 90 days, in most groups), is a good way to fill some of the time we used to spend drinking. **(Editors Note: From the pamphlet “Memo to an A.A. Group Treasurer” “The position of group treasurer is one of the most responsible positions in the group and requires accuracy,**

IN REMEMBRANCE OF "EBBY" By Bill W.

In his seventieth year, and on the twenty-first of March, my friend and sponsor "Ebby" passed beyond our sight and hearing. On a chill November afternoon in 1934 it was Ebby who had brought me the message that saved my life. Still more importantly, he was the bearer of the Grace and of the principles that shortly afterward led to my spiritual awakening. This was truly a call to new life in the Spirit. It was the kid of rebirth that has since become the most precious possession of each and all of us. As I looked upon him where he lay in perfect repose, I was stirred by poignant memories of all the years I had known and loved him. There were recollections of those joyous days in a Vermont boarding school. After the war years we were sometimes together, then drinking of course. Alcohol, we thought, was the solvent for all difficulties, a veritable elixir for good living. Then there was that absurd episode of 1929. Ebby and I were on an all-night spree in Albany. Suddenly we remembered that a new airfield had been constructed in Vermont, on a pasture near my own home town. The opening day was close at hand. Then came the intoxicating thought: If only we could hire a plane we’d beat the opening by several days, thus making aviation history ourselves! Forthwith, Ebby routed a pilot friend out of bed, and for a stiff price we engaged him and his small craft. We sent the town fathers a wire announcing the time of our arrival. In midmorning, we took to the air, greatly elated -- ad very tight. Somehow our rather tipsy pilot set us down on the field. A large crowd, including the village band and a welcoming committee, lustily cheered his feat. The pilot then deplaned. But nothing else happened, nothing at all. The onlookers stood in puzzled silence. Where were Ebby and Bill? Then the horrible discovery was made -- we were both slumped in the rear cockpit of the plane, completely passed out! Kind friends lifted us down and stood us upon the ground. Whereupon we history-makers fell flat on our faces. Ignominiously, we had to be carted away. The fiasco could not have been more appalling. We spent the next day shakily writing apologies. Over the following five years, I seldom saw Ebby. But of course our drinking went on and on. In late 1934 I got a terrific jolt when I learned that Ebby was about to be locked up, this time in a state mental hospital. Following a serious of mad sprees, he had run his father’s new Packard off the road and into the side of a dwelling, smashing right into its kitchen, and just missing a terrified housewife. Thinking to ease this rather awkward situation, Ebby summoned his brightest smile and said, *Well, my dear, how about a cup of coffee? Of course Ebby’s lighthearted humor was quite lost on everyone concerned. Their patience worn thin, the town fathers yanked him into court. To all appearances, Ebby’s final destination was the insane asylum. To me, this marked the end of the line for us both. Only a short time before, my physician, Dr. Silkworth, had felt obliged to tell Lois there was no hope of my recovery; that I, too would have to be confined, else risk insanity or death. But providence would have it otherwise. It was presently learned that Ebby had been paroled into the custody of friends

attention to detail, and accountability to the group as a whole. While there is no standard length of sobriety necessary for a member to take on the position of group treasurer, many groups suggest that the treasurer should have a reasonable period of sobriety (at least six months to a year or more). It is also suggested that group treasurers be well grounded in the Twelve Traditions and be familiar with the principles and practices of the group itself.) When these “jobs” interest you, leaf through a copy of the pamphlet “*The A.A. Group.*” It explains what the group “officers” do, and how they are chosen. In A.A., no one is “above” or “below” anyone else. There are no classes or strata or hierarchies among members. There are no formal officers with any governing power or authority whatsoever. A.A. is not an organization in the usual sense of that word. Instead, it is a fellowship of equals. Everybody calls everybody else by first name. A.A.’s take turns doing the services needed for group meetings and other functions. No particular professional skill or education is needed. Even if you have never been a joiner, or a chairman or secretary of anything, you may find—as most of us have—that within the A.A. group, these services are easy to do, and they do wonders for us. They build a sturdy backbone for our recovery.

who (for the time being) had achieved their sobriety in the Oxford Groups. They brought Ebby to New York where he fell under the benign influence of AA’s great friend-to-be, Dr. Sam Shoemaker, the rector of Calvary Episcopal Church. Much affected by Sam and the Oxford Group, Ebby promptly sobered up. Hearing of my serious condition, he had straight-way come to our house in Brooklyn. As I continued to recollect, the vision of Ebby looking at me across our kitchen table became wonderfully vivid. As most AAs know, he spoke to me of the release from hopelessness that had come to him (through the Oxford Groups) as the result of self-survey, restitution, outgoing helpfulness to others, and prayer. In short, he was proposing the attitudes and principles that I used later in developing AA’s Twelve Steps to recovery. It had happened. One alcoholic had effectively carried the message to another. Ebby had been enabled to bring me the gift of Grace because he could reach me at depth through the language of the heart. He had pushed ajar that great gate through which all in AA have since passed to find their freedom under God.

THE PALMA CEIA GROUP

THE PALMA CEIA GROUP

For about a year the Group met in Alleene and Ernest’s home. The Rev. Paul Wagner (a minister of the Methodist Church - who had been a Chaplain with combat troops in World War II – and who visited the Tampa Electric Company’s Leisure House AA open meetings on Friday nights) was the first Minister to offer his Church facilities as a meeting place for Alcoholics Anonymous. Paul has been such a tower of strength for this Group that now the Palma Ceia Group is an integral part of the Palma Ceia Methodist Church, Meeting every Thursday night, this Group has been one of the strongest and most influential Groups in the south. Since the Group’s inception in 1946, 4 of the “original 25 “ have been members until Alleene K’s death on Feb. 22, 1962.

This March, 2019, The Palma Ceia Group will be celebrating 73 years of continuous Sobriety.

AND THEY WAITED

I am a recovered alcoholic. Eleven years ago, I had my last drink, thanks to AA. It had taken those patient, ever-forgiving, and often caustic people about four years to get through to me. I had as much humility as a dictator. I used defenses like they were going out of style. I could make the Serenity Prayer seem the most controversial piece of philosophy ever written. I was an intellectual snob who torn the program to pieces. And they waited. Yes, they had watched and heard guys like me before. While most of the group went on trying to help, I’m sure they were disgusted and disheartened. They trucked the body back and forth to drying-out places, and my sponsor hung on. Somehow, some way, I got the program—because AA can wait “and not be tired by waiting,” as Kipling said in his poem “If.” I considered myself a pretty smart and able person. It should have been obvious, from the progression of my drinking, that something emotional was short-circuiting my smarts; but I could not recognize the emotional factor. When I was told to stop drinking, I refused to see sobriety as the answer. When I heard the Slogans, they came through as kindergarten psychology. When I listened to the stories of others, I agreed that they were alcoholics and that they were in the right place for them. So.....in and out, in and out, sober and drunk, drunk and sober. The smarts were working just fine. I lost my job, the family, and last, but not least, my human dignity. Was this happening to *me*? Could a smart guy let himself get caught in this self-destructive bind? I had never given a thought to my emotional immaturity. To me, maturity had meant accomplishing and getting ahead in this world, and by God I had done that! But there I was. Everything I had depended on to prove my stability was gone. At this point, I knew I had to stop drinking. But I didn’t need AA! You had better believe it! But they waited and they waited and they waited, and they were not tired by waiting.

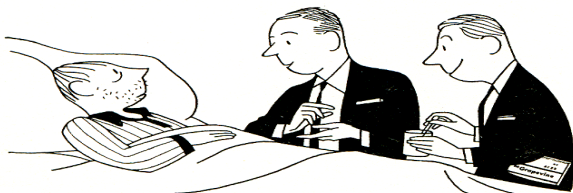

SELF-SUPPORT-February , 2019

© Today in February of 2019 we have 226 Groups with 567 meetings a week. Contributions in February totaled \$ 7,511.45. This accounts for what 41 Groups or individuals in our area have contributed in February. Included we also received \$22.00 from the Birthday Club, \$170.00 for the Big Book Raffle , \$1400.00 from the Anniversary Dinner tickets, \$217.00 from the 7th Tradition Basket, \$242.00 from the 50/50 Raffle, and \$812.25 from the Cakewalk Raffle. Our total income for February was \$ 18,408.59. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$ 8,473.24. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our February income left us with a Gross Profit of \$ 9,935.35. Our Total Expenses for February were \$ 8,200.33. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus+\$ 1,735.02 for the month of February. We are now, at the end of February \$161.00 to the good for the year. But as they say in the rooms of AA "this too shall past." No matter *how good or bad* it may appear that we are doing from one month to another, it takes your consistent contributions to keep us operating on a steady level. As our AA membership continues to grow in the Tampa Bay area, the demand for more and more material and services continue to expand and we continue to try and strive to keep up with the demand.
