MISSTEPS ON THE TWELFTH STEP

A letter to the AA Grapevine began, "I've just had a slip, after only three weeks in AA. It was only a one-night stand and I was scared, scared I couldn't stop. So I called my sponsor to talk it over. He came, all right, but we didn't talk! He lectured! Demanded to know why I hadn't remembered the things he had taught me, why I did this, why I didn't do that, etc. It sounded just like before AA. Why, why, why? Gosh, those were things I had hoped he could tell me! If another AA hadn't got hold of me that same day I don't think I would have come back to the group." The writer wants to know if that sponsor is typical. Let's not quibble! This instance is no isolated case of a "spoiled sponsor." The Twelfth Step is a beautiful thing when it is performed with complete humility and compassion by an AA who understands that he has been given another opportunity to help and to serve. It is not so pretty when he sits in judgment. Too many of us, perhaps, are concerned with running up a "score," forgetting it is a human life we are trifling with, not some game to see how many people we can "sober up." Surely, we've learned by now that the only person we sober up, or ever will sober up is —ourselves! None of us is perfect but on the Twelfth Step some of us really go haywire and the more obvious mis-users of the privilege of helping the other fellow fall into certain easy-to-recognize categories. This lecturing sponsor is the "Judge and Jury" type. He "sits" above his "baby," who is treated like a prisoner at the bar. He hands down decisions from on high out of his infinite wisdom. Another type could be labeled "the Doctor." Preoccupied by the disease aspect of alcoholism and probably being a hypochondriac himself, he "treats" his Twelfth Step cases as clinical patients. We've known some who think nothing of handing out pills when their "patients" have trouble sleeping. Then there are our "Thirty-Day Psychiatrists." They explain to the newcomer just how it is that an alcoholic gets that way and they do it with an ease that must have Freud spinning in his grave. In many instances they make AA sound so complicated that the poor drunk, already confused, runs screaming back to the bottle! Then there are those who "play God." Self-aggrandizement is what they're really seeking, not help for the other guy. Consciously or unconsciously, they get so overcome by their own good works that pretty soon they're believing it is their effort alone which sobers up so many people. I know of one man who took himself so seriously that he couldn't find time to get a job and support his rather large family. He honestly thought that "so many people were depending on him for their sobriety" that he couldn't be spared for such base, mundane matters as earning a living. Charity still begins at home! Comes now, "the Preacher—the Saver of Souls." Having had his own "spiritual experience" he feels duty bound to share his knowledge with the world, by force if necessary. A nice motive but one that runs roughshod over the fact that most alcoholics, in their first timid approach to AA, are usually God-shy. Maybe they're not atheists or even agnostics

10. Don't project about holiday temptations: remember "One day at a time."
11. Even if you cannot give material gifts, enjoy the beauty of holiday love.
12. Carry the message. Give the joy away, and it will be yours to keep.

but they're likely to have a deeply ingrained aversion to being "preached at." We have deliberately overdrawn these "types" so as to create a sharp contrast with the humble spirit of the Twelfth Step—the simple picture of one drunk sitting down with another to bring him the one thing he really can—understanding! In its finest form the Twelfth Step is impersonal! Each new call for help is a fresh opportunity to give of ourselves; to exercise and strengthen our own need to grow. Naturally, we hope with all our hearts that the poor guy we're talking to will get sober and start living. But if he doesn't—well, strictly speaking, that's his business, not ours. The situation calls for no holier-than-thou lecture. It may call for a more thorough searching of our souls to see what more we can give—a further chance for us to become still bigger persons, and better ones. If, on the other hand, our man does "get the program," it is for us to be humbly grateful, not smug. Its value to us is lost if we take any part of the credit. Our "reward" is in seeing, at first hand, the miracle happening all over again—the renewal of our own faith in the miracle of our own sobriety. Anon.

It is gratifying to feel that one belongs to and has a definite personal part in the work of a growing and spiritually prospering organization for the release of the alcoholics of mankind from a deadly enslavement. For me, there is double gratification in the realization that, more than thirteen years ago, an all-wise Providence, whose ways must always be mysterious to our limited understandings, brought me to "see my duty clear" and to contribute in decent humility, as have so many others, my part in guiding the first trembling steps of the then-infant organization, Alcoholics Anonymous.

Dr. Bob died November 16, 1950.

THE 10TH STEP PROMISES

The Big Book offers an array of promises associated with each of the Twelve Steps, but for me, the rewards starting on the bottom of page 84 and continuing throughout that paragraph are, by far, the most vibrant and exciting – these are my favorites: *“And we have ceased fighting anything or anything – even alcohol.”*

When I am living in the spirit of the Step Ten directions and resolutely turning my thoughts to someone I can help, I become much less reactionary with those who disagree with me. Being right, takes a back seat to developing a continuing friendly relationship. The first shot is not fired because the battle never begins. *“For by this time sanity will have returned.”*

I feel as though the word 'sanity' overflows from the first promise; if I am unable to differentiate the true from the false in the matter of drink, I am indeed suffering from *alcoholic insanity*. However, if I can see and act on the obvious truth in the matter of that next drink, I am living in a *sane* manner. The Big Book often uses the expression of *insanity* interchangeably with the phrase, *'mental obsession.'* Jim's Story (p. 37) is case in point. *“If tempted, we recoil as from a hot flame”*

During first sober year or so drinking thoughts would spawn deep-seated horror. If I would – as is often suggested – *Think the drink through*, the dismal memory of those horrible hallucinations coming on, the music exuding from the walls, and the jail door slamming shut filled me with terror. The dread of being fired, once again, would come on strongly. But as time passed, I learned to stymie these unpleasant thoughts before they become solidified. Actually, I believe I have developed a reverse Pavlov in the matter of drink. *“It just comes! That is the miracle of it.”*

This miracle happened for me! Thoughts of drinking no longer exists in my emotional vocabulary. This marvelous "release" took place in my second year of sobriety and I have not been plagued by the mental obsession since—thank you God! *“Instead, the problem has been removed. It does not exist for us.”*

These two phrases probably represent the most important single promise in the Big Book: a release from the insanity of taking that first alcoholic drink! Of course, this exciting promise is obviously concerning the mental obsession before the first drink. I will never be an ex-alcoholic—just one shot and I am shot! We are not told that the problem (obsession) has been eradicated, destroyed or beamed to outer space. It simply promises that it has been *removed*. That Obsession/Allergy will forever lurk, just waiting for me to fall below a fit spiritual condition. *“That is how we react so long s we remain in a fit spiritual condition.”*

I have found that living in the spirit of Maintenance Steps Ten, Eleven and Twelve, to the best of my ability, I have remained close enough to a fit spiritual condition that I haven't had to drink since my very first meeting in 1975.

© Today in October of 2019 we have 223 Groups with 536 meetings a week. Contributions in October totaled \$7,574.72. This accounts for what 43 Groups or individuals in our area have contributed in October. Included we also received \$426.00 from three AA members for the Birthday Club and \$705.00 from the Sober @ 7 Group's Anniversary Dinner.. Our total income for October was \$14,615.84. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$5,121.19. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our October income left us with a Gross Profit of \$9,494.65. Our Total Expenses for October were \$ 10,017.14. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus-\$522.49 for the month of October. We are now, at the end of October minus-\$ 679.98 in the red for the year. But as they say in the rooms of AA "this too shall past." No matter *how good or bad* it may appear that we are doing from one month to another, it takes your consistent contributions to keep us operating on a steady level. 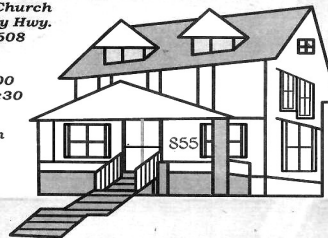
