## WRITING THE AMENDS LIST

Just after the finishing the Third Step Prayer, my sponsor, Carl, had me ask God for help with my Fourth Step information; this was simply praying to God to show me where I had been selfish, dishonest, resentful and fearful, then writing the answer as soon as it came from my deep inner self. (The Big Book mentions “*the Great Reality deep within*”—p 55) The Oxford Group—from hence came our Twelve Steps—called this practice “*Automatic Writing*.” I added more information later from memory, but at first it had to be spontaneous. Once on this paper it could not be erased or altered, especially the harms I had done to others—not to forget employers, loan companies, etc.

About a week later, we were at Step Eight and much had been added to my list, especially from Step Five, thanks to my sponsor. The Step Eight information concerning the harms to others was right there on paper—remarkably simple—and there was no backing out!

Carl informed me that although I need to be willing to make amends to everyone on that list, there were certain amends that may harm others, and some may have been impossible to execute. What to do? I was told leave them on my Eighth Step list but be careful to follow the Big Book Step Nine instructions so as not to make another person’s life troublesome. How to know? “*God gave us brains to use*” (p. 86).

I must add that, as previously stated, I came awfully close to drinking about two weeks before starting the step process. Therefore, my sponsor told me that I could not rely on my mind to put truth on paper—after all, didn’t my mind almost lead me into a bar just two weeks before? He pointed out that I had a dishonest mind. He also said that he thought I was silly as a pet coon which I did not like very much. Ha.

I think it is important to realize that to follow the Big Book Step Eight directions I needed to realize that the Steps are in order for a reason. If I would have followed the temptation to make an amends list out of order, it would not have been nearly so effective. I would not have followed the Big Book’s “*clear cut directions*.” (p. 29) I continue to thank God for providing me with a sponsor dedicated to the true AA program of action.

## TRADITION EIGHT

Alcoholics Anonymous will never have a professional class. We have gained some understanding of the ancient words “Freely ye have received, freely give.” We have discovered that at the point of professionalism, money and spirituality do not mix. Almost no recovery from alcoholism has ever been brought about by the world’s best professionals, whether medical or religious. We do not decry professionalism in other fields, but we accept the sober fact that it does not work for us. Every time we have tried to professionals our Twelfth Step, the result has been exactly the same: ***Our single purpose has been defeated.*** Alcoholics simply will not listen to a paid twelfth-stepper. Almost from the beginning, we have been positive that face-to-face work with the alcoholic who suffers could be based only on the desire to help and be helped. When an A.A. talks for money, whether at a meeting or to a single newcomer, it can have a very bad effect on him, too. The money motive compromises him and everything he says and does for his prospect. This has always been so obvious that only a few A.A.’s have ever worked the Twelfth Step for a fee. Despite this certainty, it is nevertheless true that few subjects have been the cause of more contention within our Fellowship than professionalism. Caretakers who swept floors, cooks who fried hamburgers, secretaries in offices, authors writing books—all these we have seen hotly assailed because they were, as their critics angrily remarked, “making money out of A.A.” Ignoring the fact that these labors were not Twelfth Step jobs at all, the critics attacked as A.A. professionals these workers of ours who were often doing thankless tasks that no one else could or would do. Even greater furors were provoked when A.A. members began to run rest homes and farms for alcoholic, when some hired out to corporations as personnel men in charge of the alcoholic problem in industry, when some became nurses on alcoholic wards, when others entered the field of alcohol education. In all these instances, and more, it was claimed that A.A. knowledge and experience were being sold for money, hence these people, too, were professionals. At last, however, a plain line of cleavage could be seen between professionalism and non-professionalism. When we had agreed that the Twelfth Step couldn’t be sold for money, we had been wise. But when we had declared that our Fellowship couldn’t hire service workers nor could any A.A. member carry our knowledge into other fields, we were taking the counsel of fear, fear which today has been largely dispelled in the light of experience. Take the case of the club janitor and cook. If the club is going to function, it has to be habitable and hospitable. We tried volunteers, who were quickly disenchanted with sweeping floors and brewing coffee seven days a week. They just didn’t show up. Even more important, an empty club couldn’t answer its telephone, but it was an open invitation to a drunk on a binge who possessed a spare key. So somebody had to

look after the place full time. If we hired an alcoholic, he'd receive only what we'd have to pay a non-alcoholic for the same job. The job was not to *do* Twelfth Step work; it was to make Twelfth Step work possible. It was a service proposition, pure and simple. Neither could A.A. itself function without full-time workers. At the Foundation (*General Service Office in New York*) and intergroup offices, we couldn't employ non-alcoholics as secretaries; we had to have people who knew the A.A. pitch. But the minute we hired them, the ultraconservative and fearful ones shrilled, "Professionalism!" At one period, the status of these faithful servants was almost unbearable. They weren't asked to speak at A.A. meetings because they were "making money out of A.A." At times, they were actually shunned by fellow members. Even the charitably disposed described them as "a necessary evil." Committees took full advantage of this attitude to depress their salaries. They could regain some measure of virtue, it was thought, if they worked for A.A. real cheap. These notions persisted for years. Then we saw that if a hardworking secretary answered the phone dozens of times a day, listened to twenty wailing wives, arranged hospitalization and got sponsorship for ten newcomers, and was gently diplomatic with the irate drunk who complained about the job she was doing and how she was overpaid, then such a person could surely not be called a professional A.A. She was not professionalizing the Twelfth Step; she was just making it possible. Perhaps the fear will always lurk in every A.A. heart that one day our name will be exploited by somebody for real cash. Even the suggestion of such a thing never fails to whip up a hurricane, and we have discovered that hurricanes have a way of mauling with equal severity both the just and the unjust. They are always unreasonable.

Alcoholics Anonymous found me in the rooms of a treatment center in 1997 when a nearby group bought us a meeting. When I first saw the leader, I thought how nice it was of him to give us his time and how happy he looked. After the meeting, he handed me a card with his girlfriend's number on the back and told me she would be my temporary sponsor, if I wanted one. The next day, after arguing with one of the staff in the cafeteria, I threw a temper tantrum and stormed off to my room. Then, throwing myself on the bed, I started sobbing, "God please help me. I am so sick and tired of being sick and tired." At that moment, the telephone number on the card popped into my head. I went to the phone in the hallway to call a woman I didn't even know. As the phone rang, I became anxious. I didn't know what to say or do. The woman who answered the phone had a kind and pleasant voice. I told her how I'd gotten her number the night before and proceeded to explain my situation to her: I told her that my whole life, my whole world, was falling apart. We spoke for about forty-five minutes. By the time I hung up, I had made a decision to turn my will and life over to the care of the AA program. This woman's kindness, her sincerity, and her patience during our phone conversation had set an example for me. I could hear her children in the background, but she never once screamed at them as I had done to my own children on so many occasions. She had patience; I didn't have any. I went to my first AA meeting the day I was released from treatment and have been going every day since. I've told my story and participated in service work at correctional institutions, and I've made lots of close friends in AA. I had to learn how to trust and be honest with myself and others. I had to learn how to live life. It isn't always easy, but AA gave me the tools for living, and I try to apply them on a daily basis. Today I have a new life. Today my family is watching me grow, instead of watching me die. I have a newfound belief in God and a newfound confidence in myself. Today, I enjoy waking up in the morning.

**Office Managers COVID-19 Report for July 2020**

Greetings Everyone,. It's Sunday and I'm here all alone trying to get your minutes out. I've put together a brief synopsis of where we are currently standing here at the Central Office.

Here is a current rundown of our finances. As you can see from the Budget reports provided, we were \$2,597.17 in the red for the month of July. This is due to the COVID-19 virus and the cancellation of many groups not being able to meet at their regular meeting places. We received \$4,767.96 in mail-in or brought in contributions. Our literature sales were \$3,591.43 for the month of July. Total income for the month of July was \$8,371.45. Our Cost of Goods was \$2,631.38 and subtracting COG from Total Income left us with \$5,740.07 for July. Our expenses for July were \$8,337.24. Subtracting our expenses from our Total Income, left us with \$2,597.17 in the red. A huge Thank You goes to everyone who has helped us pull through these lean months.

Staff salary was quite low, since I only came into the Office as needed for paying bills, the newsletter, updating website—etc. Contract Labor was higher because Martin was here manning the phones and helping with the few customers that may come in. However, payroll was lower compared to if I had been here full time, so this did not hurt us.

In spite of this we are still \$3,433.21 to the good for this year. We are in pretty good shape with most of our literature supplies for the time being. I will be ordering more, shortly, waiting to see how things go financially for the month of August. We currently have \$24,103.41 in our Money Market Account, \$24,531.93 in our Prudent Reserve and plenty of operating cash in our Checking Account, so I think we are okay for now. Once the groups get back to their regular routine, things should pick up.

We did purchase two new computers---haven't gotten the bill yet...it will be hefty. They are Lenovo ThinkCentre M630e Tiny..... DDR4 Memory with high-speed SSD storage, also had to purchase Windows Pro 10 and new Microsoft Office. Unfortunately, not everything was transferred over. Some documents and Dreamweaver which we use for our web site...etc. We hope to have this fixed soon...Tech guy got into an accident and will be here first week in August.

We STILL could not have a meeting due COVID-19. It seems to be rampant everywhere here in Florida. Currently, at this time, there are 1822 COVID-19 cases in the 33614 zip code area. We will try again for a Board & Council meeting at a later date when it is deemed safe. If you need literature-etc., you will still get the 20% discount.

There will be no events put on by Central Office this year. All in all, we are still in somewhat good stable condition.

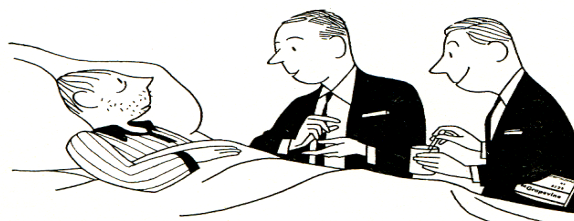

**SELF-SUPPORT-JULY, 2020**

© Today in July of 2020 we have 223 Groups with 536 meetings a week. Contributions in July totaled \$ 4,767.96. This accounts for what 46 Groups or individuals in our area have contributed in July. Included we also received \$ 294.00 from 7 members for the Birthday Club. Our total income for July was \$ 8,371.45. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$ 2,631.38. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our July income left us with a Gross Profit of \$ 5,740.07. Our Total Expenses for July were \$ 8,337.17. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus-\$ 2,597.17 for the month of July. In spite of the COVID-19 virus, our groups are still continuing to support us very generously. We thank you for your continuing support. As they say in the rooms of AA "this too shall past." No matter *how good or bad* it may appear that we are doing from one month to another, it takes your consistent contributions and support to keep us operating on a steady level. As our AA membership continues to grow in the Tampa Bay area, the demand for more and more material and services continue to expand and we continue to try and strive to keep up with the demand. That is only possible with your continued support . Thank you for all of your support !!!

## Alcoholics Anonymous, COVID-19 and Our Seventh Tradition

June 19, 2020

Dear A.A. friends,

We in A.A. – here at G.S.O., along with the rest of the world – continue to experience an unprecedented situation. Without question, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our Fellowship, including our organized service structure, is facing enormous challenges, locally and globally. For many of us, the most prominent example is that, for the first time in the 85-year history of our Fellowship, we are navigating the lack of face-to-face meetings. While we have found creative ways to allow for the vital interaction between one alcoholic and another, and welcoming newcomers daily, it is clear that the health crisis has other far-reaching consequences. As we all adapt to the present reality of digital meetings, the question now is, “How do we responsibly practice self-support, our Seventh Tradition?” As we can no longer pass a physical basket, we are working to find ways to support the Fellowship at all levels, from our groups to Intergroups and Central Offices, from our Districts and Areas to the General Service Office itself.

The reality is that even though meetings, Twelfth Step services and operations have shifted to a virtual environment, expenses continue to accumulate during this crisis, which underscores the importance of practicing the Seventh Tradition. Through this crisis, however, we have witnessed the many ways in which the entire A.A. Fellowship has come together to provide ongoing support. Among them:

- Many home groups are still paying rent even though their meetings cannot convene. They are also providing online meetings on platforms that may have associated costs.
- Intergroup/Central Offices are still stocking needed literature and fielding Twelfth Step calls, redirecting A.A. members and those looking for recovery to online meetings.
- Area-level committees are working to keep channels open between the Fellowship and the delegates and board members that make up our General Service Conference, as well as to do public information, corrections and other service.
- G.S.O. in New York is continuing to support all levels of service. Literature still needs to be published and distributed, calls need to be answered, online platforms still need to be updated, and support operations sustained.

In an effort to keep the membership informed during this challenging time we would like to share a brief three-minute video update from Leslie Backus, the Class A (nonalcoholic) treasurer of our General Service Board.
