“STEP FOUR AT A GLANCE

My sponsor, wisely, did not allow time for fear to develop before writing my Fourth Step. He pointed out that the Big Book indicates that we are to begin Step Four “at once!” (p. 64) It seems like only seconds after we prayed the Third Step Prayer that he laid out four sheets of paper with respective headings of Selfishness, Dishonesty Resentment and Fear. I was to write: “*God help me I am writing my inventory*” under each of these words. I was informed that I was not capable of enough honesty to do this alone. I needed God to help me. (After all a week or so before I had marched into a bar and **almost** spoke out: “*Gin and tonic, please—Thank God I didn’t*”). Obviously, my mind lied, so I did, indeed, need Gods help! The Oxford Group called this ‘automatic writing.’ If the words did not come from deep within, I was not to write them. No thinking allowed! I believe more honesty landed on those papers in a few minutes than many weeks out of my good-keen-intellectual-alcoholic-mind.

This was not *exactly* Step Four, but it brought about *honest* information for the upcoming Fourth Step function.

Then from page 65 of the Big book I learned how selfishness, dishonesty, resentment and fear had negatively affected me—and others. These were the very ingredients of the “bondage of self” I had asked God to remove in the Third Step Prayer! I needed to learn how to face and be rid of these aspects of my personality. How? I didn’t even know what they were! I believe such understanding is a vital function of this step. The Big Book refers to the above four character defects as our “*Grosser handicaps*.” (p. 71)

I was taught how to face and be rid of repeating thoughts of anger (resentments) on page 67. The same for irrational fears on page 68. I came to realize how dishonest and selfish I had been by my sexual conduct on pages 69 and 70. This vitally important information was necessary to adequately do Step Five with my sponsor and to be willing to ask for God’s help in Steps Six and Seven. (p. 76) Honest information from this step was even helpful in Steps Eight and Nine because I had listed my harms to others on page 70.

I was taught remain continually aware of these “Grosser handicaps” because they crop up in Step Ten all through the day and in Step Eleven before going to bed at night. Step Four is a learning process to be used in the maintenance Steps Ten, Eleven and Twelve for the rest of my life.

A reminder from the 12 & 12

Ed. Note: This reminder came from the Ladies of the Freedom in Sobriety Group)

We realize that the word “dependence” is as distasteful to many psychiatrists and psychologists as it is to alcoholics. Like our professional friends, we, too, are aware that there are wrong forms of dependence. We have experienced many of them. No adult man or women, for example, should be in too much emotional dependence upon a parent. They should have been weaned long before, and if they have not been, they should wake up to the fact. This very form of faulty dependence has caused many a rebellious alcoholic to conclude that dependence of any sort much be intolerably damaging. But dependence upon an A.A. group or upon a Higher Power hasn’t produced any baleful results.

When World War II broke out, this spiritual principle had its first major test. A.A.’s entered the services and were scattered all over the world. Would they be able to take discipline, stand up under fire, and endure the monotony and misery of war? Would the kind of dependence they had learned in A.A. carry them through? Well, it did. They had even fewer alcoholic lapse or emotional binges than A.A.’s safe at home did. They were just as capable of endurance and valor as any other soldiers. Whether in Alaska or on the Salerno beachhead, their dependence upon a Higher Power worked. And far from being a weakness, this dependence was their chief source of strength.

Editors Note: Just like in World War II and all the other wars and all the other skirmishes that have followed, A.A.’s have stepped up to the plate in every case, when it was necessary. So it is again today. Currently we are battling a battle against the COVID-19 outbreak and we need to do our individual parts to ensure success, not only for ourselves, but for the guy or gal sitting next to us in our meetings. We have something that many do not have....*our Higher Power, the Twelve Steps, and the Unity of each other*. Although a lot of meetings have closed temporarily due to this COVID-19 outbreak, there is still hope. We have listed many online meetings, local and otherwise, on our **Events Calendar** page. Thank You Jack M. FOR YOUR HELP. True, it may be inconvenient for right now, but think of the alternative. Remember, this too shall pass. Use this time to connect to people by the phone, or texting or email or at the online meetings. Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity. *God, grant me the Serenity to accept the things I cannot change; courage to change the things I can; and wisdom to know the difference.*

Allan gave his chair report, proving information that he shared at the District 2 meeting. The amount spent on Bahamas supplies is \$974.70 and Allan is coordinating with Shirley P., Area 15 Delegate, for delivery. Scott S. emailed the Treasurer's Report: donations received \$2,771.44, literature expenses \$4,812.30, operating expenses \$268.00 (Tri-County storage \$50, State registration \$70, and P.O. box renewal \$148), YTD literature expenses \$6,293.29 and Pink Can balance of \$6457.84. Larry B. read the minutes from the February 2020 meeting. The minutes were approved. Tom F. emailed his report: received 3 requests for The Man On The Bed. All were males. The Zephyrhills Broken Bottle Group had 3 members with anniversaries, 2 with seven years and one with 6 years. Unfortunately, one member had a relapse and has been placed into solitary confinement. An email directive was received from the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department that all of the volunteer program activities have been suspended until further notice because of Covid-19. Chris A. said volunteers should call in advance to see if the meetings at ACTS Drew Park are being held due to Covid-19. Ed D. is updating the institutions' volunteer contact information and meeting times and posting them to the TBAIC website. The letter from attorney Jason Levin regarding TBAIC use of his client's photo on the TBAIC website and Bridge the Gap literature as copyright infringement was read and discussed. The letter requests \$8,500.00 to settle the matter. A motion was made and passed that no action would be taken by TBAIC until a certified letter or a court document was received by TBAIC. Sylvia L. will make new templates for Bridge the Gap literature and business cards and give them to Allan D. In old business, literature requests from other districts will be considered on an individual basis, keeping in mind that contributions will more than likely decrease substantially due to Covid-19 as meetings are being suspended to follow National, State, and Regional requests for social distancing and social gatherings.

General Service Office of Alcoholics Anonymous, Inc.

The General Service Office (G.S.O.) has been receiving inquiries about how groups should respond to the COVID-19 (coronavirus). Groups and members are concerned about health and safety issues, and are looking for guidance on how to address this question. The General Service Office is a repository of shared group experience and functions as a resource center for A.A. members and groups who are looking for the shared experience of the Fellowship. Providing guidance on health issues is outside the scope of the A.A. sharing that G.S.O. offers. However, we might suggest contacting your national, state/provincial and local health authorities for appropriate information. We do have some general experience to share regarding how some groups and members have begun to address this issue. Our collected experience suggests that talking about these issues before they arise can help a group be prepared to address them in a sensible and helpful manner and allow the group to continue keeping the focus on our common welfare and primary purpose. Some groups have discussed making changes to customs at their meetings. Some examples have included: avoiding shaking hands and handholding; making sure meeting hospitality tables are sanitary; or suspending food hospitality for the time being. Regardless of group decisions, each individual is responsible for their own health decisions. Some groups have considered contingency plans in case the group is temporarily unable to meet in person. Plans have included: creating contact lists and keeping in touch by phone, email or social media; meeting by phone or online. Providing members information for the *A.A. Online Intergroup* (www.aa-intergroup.org) may serve as an additional helpful resource. If a group isn't holding its regular meetings, they may want to communicate this to local A.A. resources, such as the district, area and intergroup or central office. G.S.O. has received inquiries about the A.A. events it coordinates throughout the year. Visit www.aa.org for up-to-date information regarding G.S.O./A.A.W.S. coordinated events. Please be assured that the health and safety of attendees is a priority. G.S.O. is closely monitoring relevant health advisories regarding COVID-19 (coronavirus). We hope this limited sharing is helpful.

To all Area 15 members, We are all concerned about the COVID-19 virus and how it effects our plans for our Assembly. At this time, and subject to change, we plan to hold the Assembly as planned. We have had much discussion, as GSO has also, about the health and safety of our membership. Please take responsibility for your individual health in regards to attendance, and plan to attend only if you feel comfortable doing so. At this time, there is nothing to qualify the cancellation clause in our contract and it would be the area's full financial responsibility to pay for the cancellation. Also, as individuals, we will be responsible for our reservation in the same way. If you do not plan to attend, it is your responsibility to cancel you reservation, or you will be responsible for those room charges. Please remember to cancel through hotelinfo@area15aa.org by March 31st so your reservation can go to someone on the wait list. Please check your email daily for new communication because we do not know if outside entities like state or government officials will impose restrictions that may prevent us from meeting. Again, please check your email daily, and send out to everyone that is concerned, any and all communications. We will be utilizing the area website for all current communications. 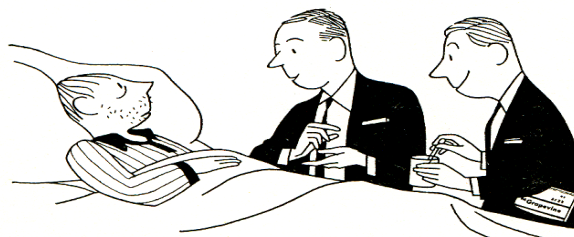

© Today in March of 2020 we have 223 Groups with 536 meetings a week. Contributions in March totaled \$ 8,170.31. This accounts for what 35 Groups or individuals in our area have contributed in March. Included we also received \$ 3,755.81 from our Anniversary Dinner hosted by the Sisters in Sobriety Group. Our total income for March was \$ 17,224.99. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$ 7,007.21. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our March income left us with a Gross Profit of \$ 10,217.21. Our Total Expenses for March were \$ 8,610.01. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus+\$ 1,607.01 the month of March. *So, thankfully and gratefully we have still started the year off in the black.* But as they say in the rooms of AA "this too shall past."
