In New Business, Barbara offered her time if Tim needed anyone to come in and key in information into the computer. Mike asked about Soberstock. Brett noted that our focus should be to keep the Central Office growing in order to provide our services to the groups. At the Council meeting, Tim thanked the Sunshine Group, the Wednesday Town and County Group and the Wellspring Group for their generous contribution of \$320.00 from last month from their Annual Memorial Day Picnic. Brett handed our "COR Information" sign up sheets, followed by a moment of silence and then the Serenity Prayer. Brett then had Brant read "What is Tri-County Central Office" which is posted in the Meeting Schedule. Brett noted that we are tonight to support the Central Office so that the Central Office can support the groups. Andrea read the June minutes. There were no questions. A motion was made and seconded to approve the minutes. All were in favor. 





Back in 2004 our annual income was around \$59,000.00 and our annual expenses were around \$54,000.00. Today we have almost doubled both of these amounts. Why? That's easy. More Groups, more people in AA. In 1998 we had 174 Groups in the Hillsborough/East Pasco area. That was 364 meetings per week in our area. Today in MAY of 2013 we have 223 Groups with 590 meetings a week. Although we may lose some groups, others spring up just as fast, that's still a lot of meetings and that's still a lot of Groups wanting material. The year to date contributions from Groups (June 2013) have totaled \$35644.69 for the year. That accounts for what 117 Groups out of 223 Groups in our area have contributed plus the 38 AAer's who contributed \$625.11 in contributions anonymously and and the 43641.00 we generated from ticket sales, the 7th Tradition Basket and a raffle at our Anniversary Dinner. And the \$390.00 from the 19 members who have participated in the Birthday Plan thus far. Also the \$589.00 from the Old School Group Anniversary Dinner and the \$305.00 from the 164 Group's 12 Step Workshop and the \$1700.00 from the Keystone Group's All Groups meeting in March. And the \$1166.50 generated from our Founders Day Event and the \$506.60 from the Friday Night Lights Group's Movie Night and the \$525.00 from the Cardinal Groups All Groups event and the \$320.00 from the Memorial Day Picnic hosted by the Wellspring Group, Sunshine Group and the Wednesday Night Town & Country Group. Our Literature sales for June bought in \$6,713.59 plus \$15.00 in Newsletter subscriptions. Contributions were \$5,645.93. Our total income for June was \$12,849.52. Our Cost of Goods Sold was \$4,633.80. Subtracting the Cost of Goods Sold from our June income left us with a Gross Profit of \$8,215.72. Our Expenses for June were \$9,151.90. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income loss of -<u>\$936.10</u> for the month of June.
