NEWCOMER IMPRESSIONS OF AA

Using the same sort of foul language that I used as a thirteen-year -old to impress my parents that I have finally *grown-up*, leaves the newcomer with the impression that I am too immature or slow-witted to be taken seriously. (psychologists call this attention-grabbing technique: "shockers")

If I mock the Twelve Steps during the reading of chapter Five (What's the point? Balk-balk, Ha! Ha! etc.) I am likely to leave the newcomer with the impression that the AA Twelve Step program is not to be taken seriously. The "Ha-Ha" may also come from seasoned members, just to be polite, although they may consider this "AA virus" as a crashing bore.

It feels good to share "let it all hang out," at discussion meetings. However, if I do not share how the Twelve Steps are working in my daily life (My experience, strength, and hope), I leave the impression that AA is limited to a group-therapy solution. Bill Wilson wrote: "Sobriety—freedom from alcohol—through the teaching and practice of the Twelve Steps, is the sole purpose of an A.A. group." * Group therapy is good, so far as it goes, but AA is better than that! We have a Twelve Step solution that really works.

If I spend my time during the important "meeting after the meeting" with my regular friends, but ignore the newcomer, I am apt to leave them with a negative impression of AA—they came in lonely and left lonely. A less-than-welcome reception may cause their first AA meeting to be their last AA meeting. I need to have AA literature ready for them with a robust welcome before they dash out the door.

I need to better maintain a neat appearance at meetings—something I am not always so good at! A general conception is that AA is comprised of skid row bums. Newcomers are happily impressed to find this is not so. After all, if I am to be trudging the road of happy destiny, shouldn't I be dressed for the occasion?

HOW OXFORD GROUP CRITICISM SPAWNED THE TWELVE STEPS.

Bill and Lois Wilson attended the NY Oxford Group shortly after Bill was released from Towns hospital late December 1934. All went well till Oxford Group members criticized them for having private meetings for "drunks only" in their home at 182 Clinton street in Brooklyn Hts. They were considered as "not maximum." (not fully complying with OG principles) Chaos developed! Consequently, during August of 1937, Bill and Lois stopped attending the Oxford Group meetings.

The yet unwritten AA program of action was now on its own in NY! Happily, the twenty-eight Main Principles (tenets) of the Oxford Group remained imbedded in the mind of the author-to be of our Big Book. Some of these tenets were accepted by Bill as helpful to alcoholics—these Are found on page xvi of the Big Book:

Moral inventory
Confession of personality defects
Restitution to those harmed
Helpfulness to others
Necessity of belief in and dependence upon God.

This later became a word-of-mouth six step program of action for the alcoholics—there were several versions of this but here is listed the version found on page 263 of our current Big Book:

- 1. Complete deflation.
- 2. Dependence and guidance from a Higher Power.
- 3. Moral inventory.
- 4. Confession.
- 5. Restitution.
- 6. Continued work with other alcoholics.

The six-step word-of-mouth program was expanded into Twelve Steps in December of 1938 (Pass it On, pages 197-198). How lucky for us that Bill was considered "not Maximum!" Certainly, a God-send for us all! Further evidence that that: "God moves in mysterious ways"!

NO MUSTS' IN AA?

How can any member of Alcoholics Anonymous say there are no musts in AA after reading the following direct quotations from our book Alcoholics Anonymous? Page xxiii: (letter from William D. Silkworth, MD) "As part of his (co-founder Bill W.'s) rehabilitation he commenced to present his conceptions to other alcoholics, impressing upon them that they *must* do likewise with still others." Page xxiv: "In this statement he (Dr. Silkworth) confirms that we who have suffered alcoholic torture must believe...that the body of the alcoholic is quite as abnormal as his mind." Page 14 (Bill's Story): "I must turn in all things to the Father of Light who presides over us all." Page 43: "The alcoholic at certain times has no effective mental defense against the first drink. Except in a few rare cases, neither he nor any other human being can provide such a defense. His defense must come from a Higher Power." Page 85: "Every day is a day when we must carry the vision of God's will into all our activities....These are thoughts which must go with us constantly...But we must go further and that means more action." Page 86:we must be careful not to drift into worry, remorse or morbid reflection, for that would diminish our usefulness to others." Page 95: "If he is to find God, the desire must come from within." Page 130: "We have come to believe He would like us to keep our heads in the clouds with Him, but that our feet ought to be firmly planted on earth. That is where our fellow travelers are, and that is where our work must be done."

HELPING OTHERS

We're in A.A. for only two reasons, to keep sober ourselves and to help others to keep sober. It's a well known fact that helping others is a big part of keeping sober yourself. It's also been proved that it's very hard to keep sober all by yourself. A lot of people have tried it and failed. I know a man that came to two A.A. meetings and after that he stayed sober alone for several months. But he fell off the wagon with a bang and was drunk the next time I heard of him. We can't do it alone. Fellowship is part of keeping sober. The doctors call it group-therapy. We never come into an A.A. meeting without taking something out of it. Sometimes I don't feel like going to a meeting and I think of excuses for not going. But I usually end up by going anyway. And I always get a lift out of every meeting. To me, meetings are part of keeping sober. We get more out of a meeting if we contribute something to it. If you get up in a meeting and tell something about yourself in order to help the other fellow, you feel a whole lot better. It's the old law of the more you give, the more you get. Witnessing and confession are part of keeping sober. You never know when you may help somebody. A girl whom I didn't know when stopped me on the street and said she'd heard me talk in a church and wanted to tell me that her brother who's an alcoholic had found sobriety down in New Jersey somewhere. When you are taking another alcoholic to a hospital, you can't help putting yourself in his place. But for the grace of God, you'd be in his place. Helping others is the best way to stay sober yourself. And satisfaction you get out of helping a fellow human being is one of the finest experiences you can have.

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Office Managers COVID-19 Report for September 2020

Greetings Everyone,. I've put together a brief synopsis of where we are currently standing here at the Central Office. Hopefully you have received my emails but in case not, here is a current rundown of our finances. As you will see from the Budget report provided, we were \$2,866.85 in the red for the month of September. I assume a lot of this is still due to the COVID-19 virus and the cancellation of many groups not being able to meet at their regular meeting places. We received \$4,479.36 in mail-in or brought in contributions. Our literature sales was \$4,267.52 for the month of September. Total income for the month of September was \$8,767.47. Our Cost of Goods was \$3,089.42 and subtracting COG from Total Income left us with \$5,678.05 profit for September. Our expenses for September were \$8,544.90. Subtracting our expenses from our Total Income, left us with \$2,866.85 in the red. Per request from many members, we opened up a PayPal account and introduced a contribution button on our web site. This month we received \$1661.00. This will not be reflected in the Budget report. For some reason I have been unable to get a connection between PayPal and our Bank to transfer the money into our account. I'm working on it and hope to have it resolved soon. So, in a sense, we were only \$1205.85 in the red. The only drawback with the PayPal account is the fee that they charge to use their services. I guess we have to take the good with the bad, in a sense. We are currently \$6,824.81 in the red for this year. We currently have \$24,103.41 in our Money Market Account, \$24,531.93 in our Prudent Reserve. Once the groups get back to their regular routine, things should pick up. We will be having our first Virtual Board and Council Meeting this October 13th, 2020. The meeting will be from 7:00 pm to 8:00 pm or however long it takes to conduct the meeting. No longer than one hour... If anything changes we will let you know asap. As always, your group will still receive the 20% discount for your literature needs anytime once during the month, it doesn't have to be the day of the meeting.

All in all, in spite of everything, we are still in good operating condition and we appreciate all the help we have received from our Board and Council members and the surrounding AA community. Please just make sure to protect yourself from the virus. You are too important to us to lose you.

SELF-SUPPORT-SEPTEMBER, 2020

© Today in September of 2020 we have 223 Groups with 536 meetings a week. Contributions in September totaled \$ 4,479.36. This accounts for what 36 Groups or individuals in our area have contributed in September. Included we also received \$83.00 from 3 members for the Birthday Club. Our total income for September was \$8,767.47. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$3,089.36. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our September income left us with a Gross Profit of \$ 5,678.05. Our Total Expenses for September were \$ 8,544.90. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus-\$ 2,866.85 for the month of September. We also received \$ 1,661.00 in contributions into our PayPal account. In spite of the COVID-19 virus, our groups are still continuing to support us however they can. Many meetings are still live, but many have gone to ZOOM for the time being due to the requirements of the facility that they meet in. We thank you for your continuing support. As they say in the rooms of AA "this too shall past." And this virus will. No matter how good or bad it may appear that we are doing from one month to another, it takes your consistent contributions and support to keep us operating on a steady level. As our AA membership continues to grow in the Tampa Bay area, the demand for more and more material and services continue to expand and we continue to try and strive to keep up with the demand. That is only possible with your continued support. Thank you for all of your support !!!

Alcoholics Anonymous, COVID-19 and Our Seventh Tradition

June 19, 2020

Dear A.A. friends,

We in A.A. – here at G.S.O., along with the rest of the world – continue to experience an unprecedented situation. Without question, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our Fellowship, including our organized service structure, is facing enormous challenges, locally and globally. For many of us, the most prominent example is that, for the first time in the 85-year history of our Fellowship, we are navigating the lack of face-to-face meetings. While we have found creative ways to allow for the vital interaction between one alcoholic and another, and welcoming newcomers daily, it is clear that the health crisis has other far-reaching consequences. As we all adapt to the present reality of digital meetings, the question now is, "How do we responsibly practice self-support, our Seventh Tradition?" As we can no longer pass a physical basket, we are working to find ways to support the Fellowship at all levels, from our groups to Intergroups and Central Offices, from our Districts and Areas to the General Service Office itself.

The reality is that even though meetings, Twelfth Step services and operations have shifted to a virtual environment, expenses continue to accumulate during this crisis, which underscores the importance of practicing the Seventh Tradition. Through this crisis, however, we have witnessed the many ways in which the entire A.A. Fellowship has come together to provide ongoing support. Among them:

- Many home groups are still paying rent even though their meetings cannot convene. They are also providing online meetings on platforms that may have associated costs.
- Intergroup/Central Offices are still stocking needed literature and fielding Twelfth Step calls, redirecting A.A. members and those looking for recovery to online meetings.
- Area-level committees are working to keep channels open between the Fellowship and the delegates and board members that make up our General Service Conference, as well as to do public information, corrections and other service.
- G.S.O. in New York is continuing to support all levels of service. Literature still needs to be published and distributed, calls need to be answered, online platforms still need to be updated, and support operations sustained.

In an effort to keep the membership informed during this challenging time we would like to share a brief three-minute video update from Leslie Backus, the Class A (nonalcoholic) treasurer of our General Service Board.
