FULLY RECOVERED ALCOHOLIC (What does that mean?")

I am a fully recovered alcoholic. This means if I throw God and AA under the bus tomorrow morning, I could be "boiled as an owl" by midnight. This is because I am helpless and hopeless over drink, save for the grace of God and AA. You may think: "What an oxymoron! How can an alcoholic be hopeless and helpless, yet claim to be recovered? Well, one happy ingredient of my recovered status is that "if I should drink" has not occurred to me for many years—it seems to have been removed from my emotional vocabulary! But for a better detailed description, here are a few promises from pages 84 & 85 of the Big Book:

- · We will seldom be interested in liquor.
- · If tempted, we recoil from it as from a hot flame.
- · We will see that our new attitude toward liquor has been given us without any thought or effort on our part.
- · We are not fighting it, neither are we avoiding temptation.
- · We have not even sworn off. Instead, the problem has been removed (This means the mental obsession—not the physical allergy). It does not exist for us.

Not so fast, there is a prerequisite! "That is how we react so long as we keep in fit spiritual condition." How? By living in the spirit of Steps 10, 11 & 12. Non-Big Book readers might state: "If I were recovered, I'd start drinking again." This is logical thinking using the normal definition of the word "recovered." However, those who have studied the Big Book can easily see the folly in that sort of thinking because they understand the allergy/obsession syndrome. The Big Book uses the recovered word in a special and technical sense that readers can easily understand.

I often use the phrase "release from the mental obsession" at meetings to avoid controversary.

Be Careful What We Say

I always knew that being Native American and alcoholic carries the burden of quite a stereotype about drinking, but I never knew how pervasive this stereotype is until recently. I'm one of a very few minorities in my home group and district. I've tried to pass on the message of sobriety to many of my Native American friends. But they are all very skittish, to say the least, about coming to meetings because of that stereotype. I constantly try to assure them no such issue around racism or stereotypes has ever arisen around me at my AA meetings. Recently, I attended a district roundup. It was such a new experience for me, and I was very happy to be there. The keynote speaker spoke about Al-Anon. She was an eloquent speaker. She is white and she mentioned that early in her life she connected and partied with some Native Americans where she lived. She mentioned that she felt different from other people and that feeling of difference was a big part of her feeling connected with the Native Americans she met. As she spoke, a few giggles spread throughout the audience, but I knew her point wasn't about hanging out with "drunken Indians." Later on, a man got up to speak and he made a statement about getting "good practice" drinking from living on the Indian Reservation in Montana. This guy was also white. His statement got a big roar of laughter out of the crowd. It was then that I could relate to the fear my Native American friends expressed when I asked them to come to AA meetings. For the first time in my sobriety, I experienced shame and distaste for those who I came to think of as family in our struggle to maintain sobriety. I did not dare look around to try to pinpoint anyone in particular. I just put my head down and prayed the Serenity Prayer. I was scared to think of how my Native American friends would have reacted if this had been their initial introduction into the AA program. I am not one to play the "race card," so please do not think of my experience as that. I love what the AA program has brought into my life. And I'm not saying I will never attend another roundup, but I am almost positive I will never attend that particular one again. My home group helps me maintain sobriety and that will be my focus.

A Note of Clarification from the Central Office......last month in the February Newsletter, page 4, I reported in the December Treasurers Report that we were 419,917.84 in the red for the year. Whoops!!!.....I made a misprint, instead of hitting the dollar sign key, I hit the 4 key. I apologize to everyone who may have gotten upset over this mistake. I will not make any excuses, my fault. It should have read as \$19,917.84. In January, along with our accountant, we were able update our end of the end Profit & Loss report to include contributions through PayPal. Our updated December P & L now shows that we ended the month \$2,507.43 in the black and our P & L Previous Year Comparison shows us \$11,850.94 in the red for the year. We did not meet the budget we had set for the year. In 2020 with the COVID pandemic our literature sales were well below what we had anticipated, along with some unexpected Office expenses (new computers and software). Our previous computers were on the verge of crashing and all our software was from 2013. However, in spite of everything, we have still managed to pay our bills on time, purchase plenty of AA literature, and keep the lights on and the phone lines open day and night for the still suffering alcoholic and our AA community at large. 

SELF-SUPPORT-February 2021

© Today in February of 2021 COVID has changed the way many groups contribute to the Central Office. Some groups have remained steady in their contributions, some groups have gone to ZOOM, A few ZOOM groups have made some contributions and other groups have folded for a lack of a space to have their meeting. It's certainly a time to renew our efforts and practice the meaning of the Serenity Prayer a little bit more. Contributions in February totaled \$ 5,241.85. This accounts for what 48 Groups or individuals in our area have contributed in February. 13 of those contributions were for \$3.00 or less. Included we also received \$41.00 from 1 member for the Birthday Club. We also received \$176.00 from the Anniversary Challenge from the Safe, Sane,& Sober Women's Group, the Simply Sobriety Women's Group and an anonymous donor. Our literature sales for February was \$ 5,344.69. This includes sales from A.A. material and non-A,A, material (medallions-etc.) Our total income for February was \$ 10,593.90. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$ 3,952.52. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our February income left us with a Gross Profit of \$ 6,641.38. Our Total Expenses for February were \$ 9,842.81. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of minus-\$ 3,201.43 for the month of February. However: Our contributions from PayPal are not included in the report generated from Quickbooks....that money goes directly from PayPal into our banking account. The true figures for February are that we received \$ 7,756.85 in contributions, so we actually ended February \$ 693.79 in the red. Not good but not as bad as the \$ 3,201.43 As a reminder, we now have a contribution button on our web site www.aatampa-area.org, it's nice, but they do charge us a fee, so unfortunately not all of your contribution gets dispersed to the Central Office. Sending in your contribution by check or money order or coming by the Office with cash is even better. Many meetings are still live, but many have gone to ZOOM for the time being due to the requirements of the facility that they meet in. We thank you for your continuing support. As they say in the rooms of AA "this too shall past." And this virus will. No matter how good or bad it may appear that we are doing from one month to another, it takes your consistent contributions and support to keep us operating on a steady level. As our AA membership continues to grow in the Tampa Bay area, the demand for more and more material and services continue to expand and we continue to try and strive to keep up with the demand. That is only possible with your continued support. Thank you for all of your support!!!

The Birthday Club: Contributions to the Office help support the local services to members and groups throughout Hillsborough and East Pasco Counties and help ensure that the A.A. message is carried around our area. Members customarily contribute \$1, \$2 or even \$5 a year for each year of sobriety—others may give a penny or a nickel a day for each day of their sobriety. Ask your Treasurer if they have any Birthday envelopes available.
