#### PUTTING IT OFF A DAY AT A TIME

Among the paradoxes that apply to alcoholics is that we are impatient procrastinators. We want success and perfection right now, but we are caught up by a disease that functions as the world's greatest delaying mechanism. Taking things slowly and gradually, as well as simply, in Alcoholics Anonymous makes character growth more solid. We are told, "Easy Does It." This does not mean, however, that we take it easy to the extreme of procrastination. The slogan often runs, "Sure, Easy Does It ... but Do It!" We in A.A. are aware that the magic word "action" is a deadly foe to the practice of putting things off. We grow within our program by accepting involvement. That does not necessarily mean total commitment, as a friend of mine points out. He tells the story of the hen that said to the pig one day, "We should be grateful to Farmer Jones for how well he feeds us. Let's repay him by affording him a fine ham and eggs breakfast tomorrow." The pig shook his head. "Hardly! For you that would be involvement. For me, it would mean total commitment." All A.A. action that reduces postponement of growth must start at home. We are told we must first get our own house in order before vital truths will be revealed to us. Even when we are ready and willing to give, nothing will happen as long as we simply sit and wait. We have to remember that procrastination means standing still, whereas the distance between any two points can be covered only by movement. There are some people who never know what is happening, others who know but choose to do nothing about it, and still others who make things happen. Any problem can be solved by following the advice to "press on." We should not move in haste; vigilance is a must. But vigilance can become boring and irksome unless we become involved with others. It is comfortable only when combined with friendship, caring, sharing, and love. And in spiritual growth, nothing takes the place of persistence. The lesson is clear: Procrastination is a thief of time. The impulse to put things off can make us feel that we have very far to go in sobriety. The antidote for that is the attitude of the trained mountain climber, who seldom looks upward to be dismayed at how much farther he has yet to climb, but, when he rests, turns to look back down upon the gorgeous vista that shows how far he has already come.

Start the year off right and go volunteer to do the coffee at your Home Group, Welcome the newcomer at the door, Help clean up after the meeting, Invite the newcomer out for Fellowship.

## District 2 - Tampa Bay Area Institutions Committee covering Hillsborough & East Pasco Counties

Mike B. opened the December 10, 2022, TBAIC Zoom meeting with the Declaration of Unity Attendees: Mike B., Scott S., John O., Tom F., Rich R., Sara R., Tracy B., Jonathan C., Joe R., Bianca H., and John T. Joe R. introduced himself as the H&I Committee rep for the YANA Keep It Simple Men's Group. His group has been carry the meeting into Cove Behavioral Men's facility and are planning to carry meetings into the ACTS Sandra Prince Intermediate Care Program. Mike B. presented the chair report. Mike B. said he has been focusing on transferring duties over to the new TBAIC chair. He said he attended the November District 2 meeting and most district positions were not filled. Mike said he plans to attend the District 2 meeting tomorrow. Additional elections will be held. He said he will mention the need for qualified people from District 2 to bring meetings into the Zephyrhills CI and also the need for qualified people to bring meetings into several treatment institutions. John T. asked if there were any questions or comments regarding the corrected November minutes. Nothing was mentioned. The minutes were approved. Scott S. presented the treasurer's report. The current Pink Can balance is \$8,063.62. Since last report, operating expenses totaled \$362.77 and literature purchases totaled \$1,395.90. Year to date literature purchases totaled \$15,195.53. The report was approved. INSTITUTION MEETINGS UPDATES Treatment facilities meetings: 

ACTS Detox. John T. said the move to new facility on North 50th Street has been completed. They have a new program manager who indicated a possible change in meeting times. Unlike the old facility, there is no bell to ring to gain access to the facility. That likely will change but until it does, access can be gained by knocking loudly on the entry door. □ Cove Behavioral Men's Facility. John T. said the YANA Keep It Simple Men's Group has been carrying the Tuesday night meetings into the facility and will continue to do so. Joe R. is the group coordinator. 

Cove Behavioral Women's Facility. John T. said an issue related to meetings at the facility was brought to his attention. He said he discussed it with the AA contact for the meeting (Leslie L.) and she will work with the Cove Behavioral manager to resolve the situation. 

ACTS Sandra Prince Intermediate Care Program. Joe R. said the YANA Keep It Simple Men's Group is willing to carry the Wednesday meeting into the facility. He left a voice mail with the program director and will re-contact to discuss. River Oaks. John T. said Jason C. said meetings were going well. He said there was a problem with patient attendance at meetings but that issued was resolved. Corrections facilities meetings: 

Pasco County Women's Jail. Tracy B. said the jail is now open for volunteers. She said she has 7 confirmed volunteers and is trying to find more volunteers. She said management of the jail is now under the county and not the sheriff's office. She said volunteers are required to complete a new form to gain access to the facility. She said she discussed meeting times with volunteers and the jail's point of contact and it was agreed that meetings will be held on Thursdays at 7pm and Saturday at 9am. Tracy said meetings will start up in January and more female volunteers are needed. 

Pasco County Men's Jail. Tracy B. and Tom F. gave background as to why District 15 took responsibility for meetings at the men's side of the jail. Both Tracy and Tom said the prior corrections chair for District 15 was no longer interested in doing the meetings and that no one has volunteered to fill that role. Tom said he called all the volunteers on the list he received from the jail's point of contact and 7 people are willing to attend meetings but so far no one is willing to serve as corrections chairperson or coordinator for the meeting. The incoming District 15 H&I committee chair has been notified and further action is awaiting her response. As of now, no meeting times have been decided. 

Falkenburg Road Women's Jail. Sara R. said the change in how meetings are being conducted is working well. That is, more experienced volunteers are chairing/ attending the Friday evening meetings with attendees who were encouraged by the courts to attend meetings. While less experienced volunteers conduct Sunday daytime meetings with attendees who volunteer to attend meetings. Sara said volunteers are welcome and anyone interested should contact her directly. Sara also said the jail point of contact told her that since meeting attendees have note pads and can access AA literature on-line there is no need to leave literature at the facility. Sara said volunteers are not leaving any literature at the facility now but that could change. 

Falkenburg Road Men's Jail. Rich R. said there have been no issues related to bringing and leaving AA literature with the men at meetings. He said there have been 33 or more attendees, both volunteers and non-volunteers, at the Friday afternoon

meetings. 

Zephyrhills CI. Tom F. said there has been a good turnout at recent meetings. He said 27 people attended last night's meeting. He said they are currently reading Chapter 5 of the Big Book and encouraging meeting attendees to take their 4th step. He said there likely will be arrangements made at a later date for volunteers to hear 5th steps. Tom said more volunteers are always needed. He said one longtime volunteer has cancer and will no longer be doing meetings. Tom said there are no other volunteers from District 2 who routinely attend meetings other than him. He said his own health is not as good as it was and he may need to cut back or completely stop going to meetings. He said he will continue to solicit volunteers and asked that others do the same. Tom said there are two members of the corrections lifers' program who have come to meetings but they travel to other prisons and are not always at Zephyrhills. Mike B. said he would announce the need for volunteers at the district meeting this Sunday. Bridging the Gap (BTG) - Tracy B. said she received 2 calls since the last meeting. Both calls were from females. One caller was looking for transportation to Massachusetts and was able to arrange that herself. The other caller was looking for a meeting and Tracy took her to the Old School Group meeting. John T. said Tracy S. said she received 2 calls and called back and got no answer but left her number so individuals can call back. John T. said he received 2 calls and contacted members on the call list who contacted the callers and arranged to get them to meetings. John T. said he assisted John O. with another call where the caller was in the same sober living facility as one of the callers who John T. had talked with on the same day. Another member on the call list was contacted and said she would arrange to get the caller to a meeting. John T. received a call during the meeting but received no response when he called back the caller. He passed on the number to an individual on the call list who also got no response when he called the call back number. Man on the Bed (MOB) - Tom F. said 12 calls from Tampa General. Contact was made and AA information provided to 11 callers. The one caller not contacted was undergoing surgery. One of the callers contacted was brought to the hospital under the Baker Act and did not want any AA information. OLD BUSINESS: 

Elections were held at the last TBAIC meeting with committee positions rotated with the following changes approved to be effective on January 1, 2023. o John O. stood for and approved as committee chair o Mike B. stood for and approved as alternate committee chair o John T. stood for and approved as treasurer o Tom F. stood for and approved as secretary o John T. said he would continue as treatment center coordinator unless someone else was interested. No one else stood for the position 

John T. said he ordered two cases of Grapevine magazine back issues for the Manatee County jail as discussed at the November meeting. He said he had not received the magazines yet. He also said he received the new Bridging the Gap business cards and placed some in the TBAIC literature cabinets at the central office. NEW BUSINESS: Literature. o Tom F. said the TBAIC literature cabinets at central office were nearly empty and he proposed the committee use PINK CAN funds to buy enough books and literature to ensure availability for TBAIC members. Tom said he would put together a list of items. John T. said he would assist Tom with the purchases. No one opposed this approach. o Sara R. requested 3 sets of tabletop 12 steps and 12 traditions for use in jail meetings. No one opposed this purchase. o Jonathan C. asked for mini Big Books at ACTS Amethyst. John T. said he had recently provided a case of mini Big Books to that facility. He said Chelsea at ACTS Amethyst should be asked about them. 

Mike B. said the Area Assembly with corrections and treatment committee meetings will be held January 13th to 15th at the Hyatt Regency, 1000 Boulevard of the Arts, Sarasota The meeting adjourned with the Responsibility Statement and the Lord's Prayer. The next TBAIC meeting will be on Saturday, January 7th, at 9:30 AM via Zoom.

#### NEW YEAR'S AND THE PERENNIAL BEGINNER

If you're new in AA, if this is your first AA New Year's, you're probably like I was — full of good resolutions. At least, you're full of resolutions to *make* good resolutions for the coming year. And I expect I know pretty well what kind of resolutions they'll be. You will, almost certainly, resolve to live this next year "one day at a time"; to watch your ego, never again to allow yourself to become prideful and too big for your britches. You'll promise to guard your humility as you would a tender and precious flower, watering it each day with gratitude. You'll resolve to try to pay back in some measure for the blessing of sobriety by being of service to others. You'll promise yourself never to turn down either a Twelfth Step call or any other opportunity to help another drunk. In that great first-year glow of AA sobriety, you will make the goldarnest set of Pollyannaish resolutions you ever heard of. And I say, good for you! Go right ahead and make them! And, if you don't keep them so good in 1956, make them all over again in 1957! And 1958! And 1958! And 1959! And I pray you'll live so long and so well that you'll be making them in 1999! Some little time has passed since I made my first AA New Year's resolutions. I'm what is called an oldtimer now. But I guess there was a period when I looked back on my first AA resolutions as "kid stuff." Sobriety had become a comfortable sort of habit. Meanwhile, I was hearing and reading a lot about the special problems of the oldtimer—all about how the meetings and the very structure of AA were geared to and for the newcomer, leaving the oldtimer out in the cold, trying not to be bored with the same old case histories, horror stories and bad jokes. I don't remember believing that, or feeling "left out." But I guess they were talking about me without my realizing it. At any rate, somewhere along the line I lost the old combination. What used to be merely an occasional bad day lengthened into weeks and finally into a full scale depression. And I couldn't pull out of it. All the fears came back. All the bafflement. And, at last, the self pity. No drinks. Oddly enough, not even a thought of taking one. It got so bad that I considered cutting my throat, but never of taking a drink. This was terrible. I tried everything, or thought I was trying everything. And nothing helped. But enough! This is not the story of the agonies of an eighteen-month depression. It's the story of how simple the answer was. Actually the answer was right in front of me all the time. Right in my own group and in the person of an old AA friend of mine named Frank. On the North Shore of Long Island, and throughout the New York Metropolitan area, Frank is an oldtimer who is listened to with respect. He's intelligent, sophisticated — and tough! He's been everywhere, seen everything. In his own words, he's known it all, from champagne in the luxury of ocean-going liners to "smoke" on the Bowery. About the time this issue of the Grapevine hits your house or Group, Frank will be finishing up his fourteenth year of continuous sobriety. Frank is no cherub—more of a gargoyle. He looks like a cross between a played-out playboy and a Spanish pirate.

Hardly the guy you'd pick as a stand-in for the innocent little naked kid with the sash who symbolizes each New Year. But Frankie is my boy, my symbol of New Year's. For, regardless of how often I have heard Frank speak at AA meetings (it must be well up into the hundreds), I don't think I ever heard him fail to tuck this little thought into his talk: "No matter how long I am sober, in AA I intend to remain the perennial beginner." Simple? Sure. Ridiculously simple. Stay as sweet as you are. Be the perennial beginner. What's it mean? It means to me—that my happiness as well as my sobriety depends on my state of mind and, please God, don't let me forget how easily I can turn anthills into mountains. It means that, by the mere passage of time, I must have assumed that I had "graduated" or "risen above" those first few simple principles. I had become too sophisticated in AA to be able to realize that the answers were always the same. I had forgotten how to "feel" like a beginner. Three years ago, the tension snapped. It was over. Frank, my tough angel, helped do it for me although he never knew it. He said "perennial beginner" again one night. And suddenly I understood. I had become a man living in suspense—without a "beginning," without any "roots." Ergo, without any real faith. Do you know what my resolutions are for 1956? Right! One day at a time. Watch the pride. Be truly humble. Be grateful. And try to serve as best I can. Those resolutions did me very well in 1944. I think they'll do equally well in 1956—for this eternal beginner! I remember hearing Doctor Bob, in Cleveland, say, "Keep it simple. AA is good because of two very simple things. Love and Service." Come to think of it, a man at Galilee talked a lot like that, too. He said, "Keep it simple," also. Personally, I don't think that AA has to be reshaped to fit the oldtimer, but rather the other way 'round. The oldtimer should keep reshaping himself so as not to grow out of the simple mold that saved him the first time around. For me, the answer is to try to remain the "perennial beginner." Call me Pollyanna. Call me slap-happy. But I'm having one helluva good time! I hope you are too. Happy New Year!

#### SELF-SUPPORT-DECEMBER, 2022

© Today in December of 2022 COVID has changed the way many groups contribute to the Central Office. Some groups have remained steady in their contributions, some groups have gone to ZOOM, A few ZOOM groups have made some contributions and some groups are Hybrid (in-person & ZOOM), other groups have folded for a lack of a space to have their meeting and some new groups are starting up, and now many groups are getting back to normal pre-pandemic live meetings. Things are looking up and getting better. It's certainly a time to renew our efforts and practice the meaning of the Serenity Prayer a little bit more. We currently have 198 Groups in the Hillsborough-East Pasco area with around 520 meetings weekly. Also we have 38 Zoom Groups with 113 meetings weekly (If I counted correctly). Contributions in December totaled \$ 10,092.81. This accounts for what 36 Groups or Individuals in our area have contributed in December, also included is \$ 5,696.29 from 7 Groups or Individuals who made contributions through PayPal. Included, also, \$110.00 from 3 members for the Birthday Club. Also included is \$417.95 from the Red Chip Day Event. Our literature sales for December was \$ 7,535.92. This includes sales from A.A. material and non-A,A, material medallions—etc.) Our total income for December was \$17,649.73. Our Total Cost of Goods Sold was \$5600.19. Subtracting the Total Cost of Goods Sold from our December income left us with a Gross Profit of \$12,049.54. Our Total Expenses for December were \$8,192.25. Subtracting our Expenses from our Gross Profit gave us a Net Income of plus+\$3,857.29 for the month of December. We still have a good Prudent Reserve, all our bills keep getting paid, the lights are on, we have a decent amount of literature available, the phones are working and it looking like 2023 just might be a better year to look forward to. 


